REPORT OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR 1977-1978

The Council has pleasure in presenting its report on the affairs of the Society for the year 1st May 1977 – 30th April 1978.

COUNCIL

The Annual General Meeting was held on 5th October, 1977 and Mrs. Monica Skeete, Mr. Alfred Pragnell and Mr. John Bowen were elected as new Council Members.

The Council wishes to thank all those members of the Council who have furthered the activities and causes of the Society with their several qualifications and who have given so unstintingly of their time.

The President has been seriously disturbed by the desperate financial situation of the Museum and has sought help from the Government. We hope that this help will be forthcoming in the immediate future and will continue during the next financial year.

JOURNAL

Volume XXXV No. 4 appeared edited by the indefatigable Mr. Peter Campbell who is the honorary editor to whom the Council expresses its gratitude. Once again the articles are of a high standard and a very welcome change is the article on the Leatherback Sea Turtle. Despite high costs of printing the Society strives to preserve the continued publication of the Journal. Back numbers are in great demand to make up sets and the Society would be grateful for any numbers donated.

TALK

At the Annual General Meeting on 5th October 1977 Canon Seon Goodridge, Principal of Codrington College gave a talk on St. Mary's Church.

LECTURES TO INTERIOR DECORATING CLASS

Mrs. Jean Blodin's class for interior decorating always includes a visit to the Museum. This begins with a conducted tour lecture by the Director

and develops into an exchange of ideas on period furniture, methods of framing pictures, arrangement of rooms for special occasions etc. The classes are always well attended and enthusiastic.

LANDSCAPING OF THE COURTYARD

An offer was made to landscape the courtyard of the Museum by an American Foundation with local connections. Mr. Oliver Messel was to do the design, transforming the flight of steps into a stage, adding to the existing structures colonnades and architectural features in the French manner. Miss Barbara Hill, an architect and Member of Council was to interpret Mr. Messel's design into working plans for the architects and this was the stage the affair reached at the period of this report. Subsequent to the period under review which ends on 30th April 1978, the overall concept was approved at a special General Meeting of the Society which took place shortly after Mr. Messel's death. Certain alterations to the original concept have been agreed and it is hoped that work will begin soon.

MR. SINGLETON'S VISIT

The Museum consultant to the Caribbean Community Secretariat, Mr. Raymond Singleton visited the Museum on his tour through the West Indies prior to the Museum/Workshop to be held in Jamaica. Mr. & Mrs. Singleton were entertained by the Council to cocktails in the Courtyard. Mr. Singleton wrote a report on Museums in the Caribbean.

FLOWER ARRANGING SOCIETY

The flower arranging show was opened by Lady Ward. The exhibits were many and varied and comment was made on the originality of the arrangements.

CANADIAN EXHIBITION

Permission was given for the Canadian High Commission to stage an Exhibition in the Museum's Galleries of photographs of the Houses of Parliament, TORONTO. The Exhibition was termed STONES OF HISTORY and was of special interest to Architects and Photographers. The Exhibition was opened with a cocktail party attended by over a hundred people. The setting was enhanced by an array of the flags of the Provinces of Canada. The Exhibition ran for several weeks.

DIRECTOR'S VISIT TO PANAMA

The Barbados Museum & Historical Society was invited by the Government of Panama to send a delegate to a Conference held in Panama in February this year. The occasion was to set up a faculty of archaelogy which will serve the entire Caribbean and South American area. The Director attended the Conference on behalf of the Society.

WATERCOLOUR OF OLD JAIL HOUSE PRESENTED

A watercolour drawing of the Law courts before the modern altera-

tions and additions was presented to the Museum. It was painted by an American prisoner of war in 1815. Curiously enough it was painted on the back of a legal document the lettering of which can be seen if held in front of a mirror.

MUSEUM CHAIRS LENT FOR QUEEN'S VISIT

Two chair were lent by the Museum on the occasion of the Queen's opening of the Community College in October 1977.

VISITORS OF NOTE

Mrs. Andrew Young wife of the American Ambassador to the U.N., Professor David Buisseux, Mr. Foley of the American Embassy, Professor Denz Blazs, Sir Herbert & Lady Duffus all visited the Museum. A visitor to the Museum descended from two distinguised Barbadians was Mr. David Alleyne Hughes. Mr. Hughes is a young English solicitor at present residing in Bermuda. He numbers Sir John Gay Alleyne and Sir Robert Bowcher Clarke among his ancestors. He is the Director's cousin and met numbers of his relations in Barbados for the first time.

PRINTS ACQUIRED

Through the Museum's Collection Fund a print of Lord Combermere (Governor of Barbados 1817–1820) and one of a Soldier in the uniform of the West India Regiment were purchased and added to the collection. That of Lord Combermere is on display with the silver waiter that was Lord Combermere's.

MUSEUM FINANCES AND DEVELOPMENT

With the ever-decreasing purchasing power of money, the Museum's finances are stretched to the limit in order merely to maintain the Museum at its present level of facilities and staffing.

In the year under review a request has been made to the Government for a substantial increase in the annual grant made to the Society as well as for a large additional grant for urgent maintenance and building works. Suggestions have also been made for expanding the staff and developing the Museum premises.

REARRANGEMENT OF JUBILEE GALLERY

The Director has rearranged much of the Jubilee Gallery as well as the contents of many of the show cases in it. The use of rich colours for back drops is found greatly to enhance the exhibits.

The modern techniques of placing objects for visitors to touch has been used and lessens the effect of the barrier between person and object.

ATTENDANCE

During the period under review 17, 197 persons visited the Museum. This figure breaks down into the following: Adults 8,289, Children 3,195 and School children totalling 5,713.

The Director, Mr. R. V. Taylor completed his course at the Department of Museum Studies at Leicester University and resumed at the Museum on 1st September 1977 as Director. Mr. Michael J. Chandler continued at the Museum until the end of the year. The Council wishes to thank Mr. Chandler for acting Director during Mr. Taylor's absence.

During the year Mrs. M. E. Heath returned to the U. S. A. and Mrs. Ivy Jeffers left to go to a better position. The Museum was very fortunate to secure the services of Mrs. K. Hinkson who adds to her typing and office management first rate accountancy.

Visitors comment on the well-kept appearance of the Museum and for this the Council is grateful to the small staff and wishes to record its appreciation.
