Also new to the shop, handsome tea towels designed by Jocelyn Gardner. One is an architectural rendering of the museum's facade; the other depicts the traditional Bajan kitchen larder and its detailed contents. Now, there's a nostalgia trip!



IVAN PAYNE RETROSPECTIVE

Each year the museum commits itself to research and curate a retrospective exhibition on the life and work of a Barbadian artist. Art and information from the early and middle years of this century have formed a growing data base: information about our cultural heritage which might otherwise be dissipated and forgotten.

Ivan Payne: Bajan Naive is the third of these exhibitions (Hector Whistler and Golde White were the first and second).

The colourful and evocative exhibition is accompanied by a detailed and scholarly catalogue, available in the shop. The catalogue represents a year of curatorial research and tracking down art, letters, contacts and reminiscing acquaintances. It is certainly a valuable addition to the documentation of Barbadian culture.

The stylistic tensions in Payne's work are of great interest: often perceived as a "primitive" or "naive", he thought of himself as a realist.

His work is also of great value as a pictorial record: detailed scenes of Speightstown, of a Land's End no longer recognizable, of folkways and work patterns long gone bring the past vividly to life.

Don't miss this one! The show remains in the newly refurbished art gallery till the end of January.


