

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In this my first message as President of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society, I must first pledge my continued commitment to the development of the Museum and its programs.

We are quickly recognizing that as the Museum expands its activities and solidifies its existing work, greater, more detailed care is required. Accordingly, we have decided to increase and streamline our Sub-committee structure.

Following are the Council's Sub-committees, with a synopsis of their responsibilities, and the committee head.

Committees existing prior to 1990:

- 1 Exhibitions: Examines portfolios and recommends artists requesting exhibitions. Miss Alissandra Cummins
- 2 Staff Conditions: Personnel management and policy. Prof. Woodville Marshall.
- 3 Publications: Editing and publication of Museum Journal. Dr. Anthony Phillips.
 - 4 Archaeological Legislation: Advises government on need for protective legislation.

5 Shop: Management, production and staffing of Museum Shop. At present, has an expanded body to oversee Shop Development Project. Mrs. Jean Goddard.

Newly Formed Committees

6 Marketing/Public Relations: To publicize museum's community identity; plan and augment marketing strategies and P.R. campaigns; and assist in fund-raising functions. Dr. Trevor A. Carmichael.

7 Financial Management/Corporate Fund-Raising: To provide continuity for the museum's governance and management. To monitor revenues and expenditures, establish management policies, and participate in corporate fundraising activities. Dr. Trevor A. Carmichael.

- 8 Constitutional Reform/ Membership: To advise Council on the updating of the Museum's Constitution and By-laws. To oversee the management of the membership function and suggest strategies for membership campaigns. Mr. Jack Dear.
- 9 Policy Management: To recommend operational and framework policies defining the structure and mission of the museum. To give priority to drafting a professional code for Council and staff of the Museum. Mrs. Joyce Gale.


We are looking forward to your active involvement in the business of the Museum, and hope that you are able to help increase our membership and diversify the base of membership recruitment.

SILVER SANDS EXCAVATIONS

Dr. Peter Drewett, who was recently in the Island, took the opportunity to give an update lecture on the 1989 archeological excavations at the Silver Sands Heritage Park.

Analysis of the ceramic pieces revealed an unusual style which seems to be the craftmanship of an unconventional ceramist at the Silver Sands site. Unusual features included extensive finger indentations in bowls and items which could either be toys or models of pieces which would be made later.

Several artifacts were also found which indicate various stages in the manufacture of shell tools.



IN MEMORIUM

The sudden death of the late Mr. Mark Hunte is deeply regretted by the Council and Staff of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society. For many years a staunch supporter of the museum, Mark had served as our Honorary Secretary between 1977-1987. His knowledge of Caribbean Art served Barbados well on many occasions and his abiding interest created the highly successful Caribbeana Exhibition which contributed so much to our knowledge of this subject. Mark had also been in the forefront of the development of the museum's collections. His contribution will not be forgotten.

It is difficult to add to the tributes paid to one so widely loved and respected as Lady Grace Adams. Born into a colonial, Edwardian society, she saw and participated in Barbados' growth into a modern nation.

Cherished by family, friends and colleagues for her integrity, her keen wit, her intelligence and graciousness, she was a tower of strength to all who knew her.

Wife of one Prime Minister, mother of another, she supported them loyally in victory and defeat, and bore their loss with dignity and fortitude.

The council and staff of the museum wish to express their sense of loss at her death; and yet of gratitude for a long and well-lived life, for which our society is the richer.

MUSEUM EDUCATION ENTERS THE '90'S

The museum's Education Officer and docents began a busy term with a January workshop. As well as planning and scheduling for the term, they enjoyed Curator Lesley Whatley's presentation Biography of an Artifact; Lesley took the group behind the scenes and through the stages of documentation and processing each artifact undergoes. The docents went on to a term of 45 gallery classes, teaching 1439 children.

For six weeks in Feb/March, the museum hosted a workshop for trainee art teachers from Barbados Community College. Participants explored the educational resources of the museum, and learnt object-based techniques to enhance their teaching skills. The group finished their six Fridays with two volunteer sessions, helping the museum with its research and cataloguing. This is the second year this program has been offered, and it seems likely to become a fixture.

Planning has also begun for a museum day camp for hearing-impaired children. A small trial camp will be offered in the Easter holidays, and funding is being sought for the projected two-week summer camp.



Also near completion are two longstanding projects, one to make the museum wheelchair-accessible, the other to replace our hodgepodge of signs with an attractive, ledgible signage system.



MUSEUM ADVENTURES, 1990

Here is the news you've been waiting for! Our fourth annual cultural tour will be to Brazil this year. Scheduled for late October/November, the tour will be for 13 days (with an additional 4-day option), and will include short stays in their major cities.

In Sao Paulo we'll visit some of the great museums of the region while experiencing a rich cultural heritage through exciting cuisine and performance arts. The city of Belo Horizonte is the centre of a major historic area. The whole town of Ouro Preto is a baroque treasure; Congonhas is home to the magnificent soapstone sculpture of Aleijadinho Mariana; Tiradentes and Sabara will also merit a visit.

Finally, the state capital, Salvador, is a colourful festive city, which remains the African heart of this Latin country. Candomble, capoeira and Colibri will all be new words for your cultural vocabulary.

An additional 4 day tour to Iquacu and Porto Alegre will be optional. Interested members should contact the Museum's office to leave their names and addresses.

A special orientation session will be held at the museum on 2nd May at 5:00 p.m., with an introductory talk, a video and refreshments.

MUSEUM ADMINISTRATION AND THE WINDS OF WAR

ICOM (International Council of Museums) recently held a meeting on museum administration in Costa Rica. Over 50 participants from 17 Latin America and the Caribbean countries attended.

Barbados was represented by MAC's (Museums Association of the Caribbean) president, Alissandra Cummins, who gave a well-received address, The Role of MAC in Regional Museum Development. Reports and papers on museum administration issues were given by all participating countries, and made for a most successful meeting.

Filling in myriads of forms over the last 2 years has finally paid off in the announcement by the UNDP's project director that a \$350,000US grant has been approved. This grant, for Caribbean museum development, will be administered over a two year period.

An alarming event was the Panamanian report on extensive damage done to their museums, including looting of prehistoric gold jewellery, during the recent military disturbances. The damage highlights how vulnerable our region is without proper legislation to protect against the illegal sale and transport of cultural materials.

ENVIRONMENTAL LECTURE SERIES

Since 1988, the Barbados Museum has co-sponsored an ongoing series of lectures with the Barbados Environmental Association. Though primarily focussing on local environmental issues, the series has included revealing glimpses at international issues.

We encourage all our readers to become more involved in the series, which often includes slide presentations and a forum for stimulating discussion. Lectures are held on the second Tuesday of each month.

EXHIBITS TEMPORARY AND PERMANENT; BEGIN-NING THE DECADE

February saw Lilian Nicholson's Mas Vibes-Rituals of Life. The timely theme of Lilian's exhibit was Carnival, Mas Sacred and Mas Profane. Carnival, she sees as "a purifying rite, moving from the Mud, Sweat and Beers of Jouvert Morning through a riot of colours and ecstasy of pan into the gentle glow of last lap and the ashes of Wednesday morning."

Mas Vibes was followed by Sylvia Bews-Wright's Dear Christine..., which conveys paradoxes of a different sort. Beautiful young women lounging on a beach are juxtaposed against the chilling letters of ill-treatment that turn up in the tabloids. The sunny public facade, the disturbed inner self... The exhibition ends in early April.

And thence from inner explorations to national statements. The British High Commission has organized Britain Towards 2000, a photo exhibition, and will feature Britain's innovation in many fields: technology, industry, medicine, urban development and the environment. The exhibition will be accompanied by 30 very realistic replicas of the Crown Jewels. The exhibit will be open April 7-27.

military Exhibit: The Challenor Gallery is now reopened with a new display focussing on the island's military history. Closed for over a year, the gallery space was completed renovated to allow access to the new administration block. This gave us the opportunity to rethink the exhibit space, while new display units were built and installed by Museum Technician Dennis McCollin.

The new exhibit was researched and developed by curatorial staff Steve Hackenberger (now returned to the US) and Lesley Whatley, with the able assistance of local historians Warren Alleyne and Peter Campbell.

Objects from the Museum's collection of militaria, including ceramics, silver, uniforms, and prints were carefully selected to complement the text. Education Officer Wendy Donawa devised a useful time-line of events from early settlement till the end of World War II

The new display has little resemblance to the previous one, as its objectives are somewhat different. It is presenting a broad historical overview, for a more general, less specialized audience than before.

VOLUNTEER POSITIONS OPEN

Like the devil, the museum can find work for idle hands. Here are some interesting positions we would be glad to fill:

Fine Arts Curator Lesley Whatley needs a volunteer with research skills to assist with the cataloguing of the military collection.

NUMISMATICS FOR THE CENTRAL BANK

The Central Bank of Barbados has recently contracted the museum to develop and install a permanent numismatic (coin) display for the Bank's lobby.

The display will highlight the historical development of currancy and trade in the Caribbean, with a focus primarily on Barbados.

It is hoped to display specimens of coins and paper currency from the Bank's collection. However, we may have to approach other institutions and private collectors for rare and early Caribbean pieces.

The Bank also plans to have a separate display unit with sets of commemorative coins for sale to the public.

We are seeking assistance from various collectors and/or owners who may have early Spanish coins, Barbadian tokens, weighing scales etc. in their possession.
