60th ANNIVERSARY

From April 1993 the Barbados Museum and Historical Society celebrates 60 years of existence with a series of events spanning one year. Some of the early events in the Museum's 'life' include:

April 15, 1933 Founding meeting of the BMHS.

May 31, 1933
Society incorporated by act of Legislature.

June 21, 1933
1st exhibition held at Queen's Park House.

September, 1933
Society granted 99 year lease on the Garrison military prison.

November, 1933
1st issue of the Journal published.

April, 1934
Watson Collection of Natural History acquired.

May, 1934
Museum opened its doors to the public.

We are therefore taking this opportunity to highlight these important events as well as to organise an effective marketing and fundraising campaign.

Meeting last November were introduced to the programme, and their comments invited and endorsement sought. The success of the programme relies very heavily on the enthusiastic support and involvement

of all our members. The activities to be planned include:

- 1. Development and Launch of an Endowment Fund.
- 2. A social and cultural programme including a variety of activities such as coffee mornings, teas and dinners, a fundraising cruise, a megafete, an easter opera season and special open days. During the summer a children's nature camp will be held.

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- 3. A membership drive is also proposed.
- 4. A series of publications is under consideration including a special issue of the Journal, an illustrated museum guide, a museum cookbook, a children's ABC and an art catalogue spanning 60 years of Art in Barbados (produced in conjunction with a retrospective exhibition).
- 5. Various promotional activities are already underway including the development of special T.V. spots and fillers on the museum, a special postage issue, front cover of Bartel directory and many others. We hope to be able to retain the services of a professional individual or agency to develop an effective marketing campaign for this programme.
- 6. The Museum's Shop proposes to develop a special series of anniversary items to mark this event.

Members and friends are asked to get involved and volunteer their help in any area. Contact the Museum for further information. We hope to make 1993-1994 the year in which members are more actively involved in the development of your museum.

OUR 59TH AGM

Over 50 members turned out on November 24th to attend the Annual General Meeting and heard Dr. Carmichael, President of the Society review the activities of 1992 and outline plans for 1993. Dr. Carmichael noted particularly the vital role which the museum plays in the development of youth education, through the Children's Gallery, school and summer programmes.

Once again he challenged members to introduce more new recruits to the Society, particularly during the Museum's 60th Anniversary year in 1993/94. Dr. Carmichael informed members of the Museum's plans for a vigorous social and marketing campaign to mark this event.

Prof. Stanley Reid as guest speaker offered a bracing analysis of the institution's previous year. He posed a number of questions to the audience - Why had the museum only 1,000 members on record after 60 years? Why weren't more members using their skills to volunteer assistance to the organisation? Finally he offered four major recommendations for the Society to consider:

- 1. Examine the Museum's resources and the rôle it plays in its entirety. For example set up permanent exhibits throughout Barbados where museum staff could provide the expertise.
- 2. Look at existing programmes and focus on some priorities which could gain corporate support.
- 3. Make the Board of Directors work and deliver the goods.
- 4. Develop plans to increase corporate

membership.

His recommendations seemed to find favour and certainly gave us all food for thought.

The Museum's new Council was elected unopposed and it now comprises: Trevor Carmichael (President), Jean Goddard (Senior Vice President) Elombe Mottley (Junior Vice President), Joyce Gale, Woodville Marshall, Albert Graham, Joscelyn Gardner, Kathleen Drayton and Keith McIntosh (the latter two being members). The new President also introduced the new Government Appointee, Ms. Marilyn Grosvenor of the Ministry of Community Development and Culture.

AWARD TO PRESIDENT

The Barbados Museum experienced a proud moment in its history. Our President, Dr. Trevor Carmichael was awarded the Silver Crown of Merit in this year's Independence Honours List published on December 1st, 1992.

Dr. Carmichael who was the President of the Barbados National Trust for five years, and more recently Chairman of the Governor General's Environmental Awards Committee, has been presented with the SCM for his contributions to law, financial services and the preservation of Barbadian heritage. On behalf of all Museum staff and members, we take this opportunity to offer him our heartiest congratulations!

SPOTLIGHT

"LINE AND SPACE"

In January Jo Robinson-Harris exhibited her perspex, acrylic and stone sculptures in our exhibition gallery. The exhibition entitled 'Line and Space' ran from 9th January until 2nd February, 1993 and elicited considerable interest from the viewing public.

ARCHITECTURE EXHIBIT

The latest permanent Museum exhibit currently being installed features the historical development of Barbadian architecture; from the simple yet efficiently designed chattel house to the grandeur of plantation great houses. Building materials, decorative elements and a scale-size model will enrich the exhibit which has been funded in part by a donation from the Barbados Institute of Architects.

The Barbados Museum needs your financial support at this time. It is a non-profit public institution. Therefore



XAVIER IS BACK

Well known St. Lucian artist Llewellyn Xavier will be exhibiting new work in Barbados at the Museum in February.

Entitled 'Global Council for Restoration of the Earth's Environment' this collection of assemblages is a warning about the destruction of the world's environment, and Xavier's hopes to awaken world consciousness.



These works are made from recycled material, incorporating historic prints, seals and signatures, and painted elements by Xavier. We in Barbados, are privileged to have an opportunity to view and acquire these latest works by the artist. The show runs from 6th February to 3rd March.

SANTO DOMINGO BIENNIAL

The 1st Painting Biennial of the Caribbean and Latin America, at the Galeria de Arte Moderno, Santo Domingo, is the second event I have attended in the last few months that left me feeling energized and positive, the first being Art Over Sugar, held in August of 1992. These two events have left me feeling excited about the arts in this part of the world. We are creating a visual language that describes our varied experience as Caribbean/Latin American people.

The strong showing of work from the entire region at the Biennial made it clear that we are a force to be reckoned with. Amidst all the fanfare and protest surrounding Columbus and his 500 year anniversary, the 250 artists showing over 450 works were saying to the rest of the world, "We are also discovering the power of our unification, because never before have we been united as a creative people under the same roof in our own region, believing in the value of what we have to say about ourselves".

There were some political and organisational problems. Unless we artists make our dissatisfaction clear, and convince government to keep art events at a distance from political patronage, Caribbean culture will remain marginal on the world scene. So desperate are artists for showing space, we accept mismanagement and political opportunities as modus

operandi.

This aside, the importance of such an event cannot be overstated. I felt the Biennial contributed in a more dynamic way to true Caribbean integration than either the Federation or CARICOM. The artists and their work continue to develop a greater understanding of the Caribbean context which will enhance the development of a visual language that we can call our own.

In speaking with Ras Ishi Butcher, he stated that his receiving the Gold Medal propelled him to produce more work, with greater confidence. He is investigating topics that previously made him nervous. He feels legitimized and as though he can speak with more authority. Maybe he feels a greater responsibility to the recognition bestowed on him.

There was a lot of intriguing and very relevant work that incited discussion and introspection. I urge my colleagues to become aware of what is going on in our region. Attending or participating in these events will blast us out of our relatively easy lifestyles, and force us to take stock, reevaluate and hopefully move into that part of ourselves that will make us examine our realities and stretch our existing definitions.

COMMONWEALTH ASSOCIATION OF MUSEUMS (CAM)

The Director attended the Triennial Meeting of the Commonwealth Association of Museums as Barbados' sole delegate in Ottawa between 15th - 18th September. The meeting's main focus was the Role of the Museum in your Society: Cultural Context and Cultural Diversity. Challenging papers were presented by a number of speakers stimulating very useful discussion, especially on issues relating to museums in post-colonial societies.

As a member of the Board, Ms. Cummins was involved in discussions relating to new rules of procedure for the CAM, the regional workshop project, objectives for the next triennial period and amendments to the constitution.

Ms. Cummins was elected as Vice President (1992-1995) of CAM's new board and was assigned

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special responsibility for CAM's regional workshop programme. The Museum is grateful to CAM for partially sponsoring Ms. Cummins' trip.

INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF MUSEUMS (ICOM)

Between 19th-26th September, the Director also attended the ICOM Triennial General Assembly in Quebec as the sole Barbadian representative. In her capacity as Chairman of the Barbados National Committee of ICOM, Ms. Cummins participated in all ICOM Advisory Committee sessions (made up of chairs of all ICOM National and International Committees), elections and observed the sessions of the Executive Council. She also reported on the ICOM Museum Basics Training Workshop held in Barbados in 1991 to the members of the International Committee on the Training of Personnel (ICTOP) and attended the ICTOP seminars held during the week.

The plenary session of ICOM was declared open by UNESCO Secretary-General, Frederico Mayor, and President Alpha Oumar Konaré of Mali (retiring president of ICOM) chaired the General Assembly sessions.

As a member of the Ethics Committee of ICOM, Ms. Cummins was involved in discussions relating to the position of ICOM with reference to the Hague Convention of 1954 (on protection of cultural property in times of war). Ms. Cummins was elected Vice-Chairman of the Advisory

Committee of ICOM for a three year term.

GIFTS

The Museum's meeting room was recently graced by a gift from the Barbados Turf Club of eight chairs to match our meeting table. The Barbados Turf Club continues to prove itself to be a good friend and neighbour of the Museum in many ways. Senator Amory Philips' and Mr. Evelyn Lord's observation of this need was followed by a spontaneous and generous offer. Our grateful thanks to our friends across the road.

Our very special museum friend Mr. Noel Frost has once again very kindly donated his earnings of \$1,083.00 as a result of the sale of stamps in the Museum Shop. Noel is a prime example of imaginative fundraising for the Museum. Thanks again.

DOCENT VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

At the recent Annual General Meeting our President, Dr. Trevor Carmichael, and Professor Stanley Reid gave high praise to the Educational Programme, and the part played by the Docents (Teacher Tour Guides). This small (far too small) group of dedicated persons - all women so far - are fully trained before setting out as "Docent" guides, and their initial training is followed up by refresher seminars each year, generally in January and/or March.

I have been a docent for about five years, and I can assure you it is a most enjoyable and satisfying position. I deal with all age groups, from 5 year olds, through teenagers to adults. I meet, mix and associate with all types and "flavours" of people. There are the school children whose minds are fresh and lively, eager to know more about our culture, history and therefore through their own

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observation and questioning, ambassadorial folk, foreign dignatories, governmental groups, foreign speakers both French and Spanish; locals and other West Indians.

In fact this is a melting pot. Meeting so vast a variety of people means an exchange of cultures. Surely this is a great necessity today, and vital for the development of the Caribbean Basin, in fact the Caribbean person.

Earlier I said we were a "far too small" group which consisted of women only. We urgently need volunteers, both men and women. am sure there are members of the BMHS who have the "know-how" and would make excellent docents, just as I am sure there are other people out there - your friends, nonmembers, the public in general who could join the docent force. This can be, and is, a new and exciting challenge. Don't wait to consider or think about it. EARLY HISTORY

A book by Peter Campbell entitled 'Some Early Barbadian History' will be published within a few weeks. It is essentially a collection of essays. Two of these (on Richard Ligon and Walronds) correct and revise articles which have already appeared in the Museum Journal; the others deal with subjects on which little, if anything, has previously been written.

Those who have written on the history of Barbados in the first half of the 17th century have relied for much of their information on 'Memoirs of the first Settlement' and John Scott's 'Description of Barbados'. Both of these are long out of print, and Peter Campbell has reproduced the text of them at the end of his book. Keep an eye out for it in the book stores.

BIM CELEBRATES 50

In devoting this 74th issue of our magazine to a commemoration of its birth in December, 1942, we were encouraged by our most faithful readers and contributors and by the generous response of a number of others-business places and private individuals who have wished us well over the years, all fifty of them.

As for this special issue, No. 74, the occasion dictated the contents. First, we had to bear in mind that BIM has acquired a readership over the last half century which has very little knowledge of the circumstances of its birth and development. commemorative issue seemed a good place for little modest retrospection. And although we still think of ourselves as a Barbadian literary journal, it seemed good and useful to point out that BIM has long since travelled far beyond Barbadian confines. The selected stories, poems and reviews now published are meant to signify not only the geographical spread of the contributions but also some of the early flowerings of the reputations which have grown into golden maturity.


For some time it has not been possible

for BIM to follow the original schedule of publication twice a year - June and December. Printing costs are too high for such regularity. But we appear as often as we can and promise to continue to do our best. With the kind of support and goodwill we have had, there is no good reason why BIM should not last another fifty years. There is something we have noticed about institutions: that the older they are, the longer they will live.

LIBRARY NEWS

The Library continues to provide research to overseas clients and twenty-five

Tall, elegant candle sticks contrasted wonderfully with the collaged masks nearby; and the basketry included traditional designs blended with innovative forms and colours.


