


### MUSEUMS AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES

The concept of an International Museums Day was adopted as a resolution of the 12th General Assembly of ICOM meeting in Moscow in 1977. The Assembly thought it expedient, with the aim of unifying the efforts of museums and drawing the attention of the world to the activities of museums, to hold an annual International Museums Day. The Assembly proposed holding the day using the slogan: "Museums are an important means of understanding, cooperation and peace among people."




The theme proposed by the National Committees of the International Council of Museums (ICOM) for the 1993 International Museums Day is *Museums and Indigenous Peoples*. This theme concurs with 1993 being the United Nations Year for Indigenous Peoples.



#### PAPER-THIN PROBLEMS

Is your favourite book so wormeaten that it looks like Swiss Cheese? How about your son's drawings from scout camp? Are they so faded that you can hardly make out the starfish from the breadfruit leaf? And has your only picture of long-lost cousin "Imelda" stuck tight to the plastic in that nice album you bought down town? If the answer to any of these questions is 'yes', then you're having paper conservation problems.


Like you, museums and archives are faced with the task of trying to preserve valuable documents on paper. To assist us, CARICOM, UNDP and UNESCO recently sponsored a four-day workshop in Antigua. About twenty participants, including our Curator of Natural History, Philippa King attended.

Incidentally, to protect your photographs from that annoying sticking, you should purchase albums which have sheets made of polyester plastic. This plastic, unlike most, is considered to be stable and inert. Mylar is a common brand-name for this type of plastic. The best way of minimising fading is to keep your documents away from direct sunlight. The ultra-violet radiation in sunlight is the culprit responsible for most fading.

Your best defence against bugs and pests is regular maintenance checks. You also need to look out for sun-faded covers, moisture and mildew, excessive dryness, torn dust jackets and damaged books. Once you've identified your

problem areas, call us for advice on how to proceed.

Over the next few months, the Caribbean Regional Museum Development Project will continue with workshops in Jamaica, St. Lucia and Barbados. The Barbados Museum will host "Museum Education" and "Cataloguing and Registration" in April.

With a full dozen abroad, school groups, groups from institutions and special-needs visitors will be well catered for throughout the coming year.

## **JUNIOR CURATORS**

Last summer saw the launching of the Junior Curators Program, a juggling act where all three balls landed in the right place.

First, it was a skills-training program providing three highly motivated teens/young adults with employment. Second, it extended the Museum's resources by three pairs of hands, three brains, and a great deal of energy. And finally, it served the community by operating the Summer Tours Program for over

2000 visitors from summer camps and youth groups.

We hope to repeat the program this summer. Last summer's places were generously funded by CIBC and CARNEID. This year, either three of four places will be available for responsible young adults with a strong interest in heritage and culture, and the ability to work with people.

## Expanding culture and shrinking incomes.

The Museum frequently shifts uncomfortably on the horns of its dilemma. On the one hand is the desperate need to expand income, and especially, increasing the number of paying visitors who come through the door. On the other hand, our mandate is to serve a community increasingly concerned with bread and butter survival.

One solution: We are actively seeking funding to pay the costs of a monthly Open Day for the general public. Our annual Open Days have been well attended and much appreciated by many who could not have afforded the admission. They have also been enjoyed by many who were able to show their appreciation by generously donating what they could afford.

Our first Open Day will be in April, date to be announced, to coincide with the beginning of our 60th anniversary.

Docents will be on hand to give guided tours, and a musical group will offer entertainment during the afternoon. We hope it will be a real community celebrating, and a reminder that, institutionally or personally, the poor in pocket can still be rich in spirit and cultural heritage.
