WHIRLWIND OF FUN

Having forty energetic youngsters swirling throughout the Museum for a week of activities was certainly an event not predicted by the Met. Office; nonetheless it occurred and we survived to tell the tale.

The Barbados Museum's Children's Green Camp got off to a fun start on 9th August, fulfilling our Natural History Curator's dream of having a lively, nature-based summer programme for eight to eleven yearolds.

One of the first lessons the children learnt was the unpredictability of the weather at this time of year; they left the Museum in brilliant sunshine to journey to the beach behind the Drill Hall and were drenched on their return walk across the Savannah. In the interim they had collected all manner of seaweed, shells, stones, seeds and crab bits which they would later use to decorate photo frames made from discarded cardboard.

On the second day they joined Dr. Peter Drewett and his team of archaeologists at Hillcrest Bathsheba. They quickly discovered how to identify pottery sherds and did surface collecting along the cliff top. They got dirty digging in test pits, tried to identify shell fragments and washed their finds.

As the week progressed, they tramped through the muddy waters of Graeme Hall Swamp to admire the lotus flowers and egrets. One boy discovered a fabulous godhorse (stick insect) and showed true communication with nature by gently lifting it off its perch and providing the opportunity for several others to examine it up close. They later returned it to its branch.

They pretended to be water, brown and green garden matter, and air, and learnt how to build a compost heap. The yells were riotous when they explored a garbage bag to see just what we humans toss out.

The Green Camp was fortunate in attracting the generous sponsorship of many persons. We are especially grateful to the Multi-National Women's Group, who believed in our programme and Concordia Life Insurance Corporation who to our President's responded request.

JUNIOR CURATORS

Much of the credit for this summer's successful programme is due to our Junior Curators.

The Junior Curator Programme, now in its second year, is an employment project for young adults interested in heritage conservation.

All are trained as tour guides, and gave tours through July and August to 58 groups with a total of 2,333 visitors.

They also performed as curatorial assistants, doing research, making labels, preparing material for the School Programme's September term, assisting in cataloguing and registration.

ARCHAEOLOGY

An archaeological excavation at Codrington College has revealed that the now rare sea egg formed a substantial part of the diet of the inhabitants of a 17th century plantation.

Professor Loftfield and 18 students from the University of North Carolina, along with 20 students from the University of the West Indies, have spent four weeks conducting an archaeological dig on the grounds of the college in St. John.

In addition, a test excavation of a slave village was also done at Springhead Farm in St. James.

When asked what sparked his interest in the site at Codrington College, Dr. Loftfield said that supplies for a colony in North Carolina which he had been investigating came from Barbados.

"In order to understand the happenings in North Carolina we had to find out what occurred in Barbados," he explained. "We came here to investigate the 17th century colonial period and what we find is permitting us to more accurately interpret what we are finding at the site in North Carolina," ProfessorLoftfield added.

In noting the importance of the site the professor said that most of the early plantations have been used to grow sugar thus disturbing what was there before. "At Codrington things have remained undisturbed because it is the site of a college," he explained.

Due to the excavation Miss Gail Clarke, 23 a graduate of the Cave Hill Campus now has "a whole new way of looking at things". In terms of the course she said, "it is not thought of as fun, it is a lot of work but it's very interesting if you are serious about archaeology".

Another Barbadian student Miss Heather Cheltenham, 23, agreed, "it's a lot of work but you learn about artifacts and how slaves lived on the plantation". When asked about the need for protective legislation for these type of sites, Professor Loftfield said it is needed because "they are all too easily destroyed by modern development".

OF GENEALOGY AND LIBRARY HAPPENINGS

We often receive queries about our genealogical research - What is it? How do you go about it? What are the Museum's resources?

Our reference library is often visited by overseas people checking on our records preserved in books, photographs and family bibles.

Recently we were happy to be able to show a family visitor the signature of her ancestor and the copy of an original document in the Quaker file. She was so delighted.

We were able to provide an immediate copy of the will of Sir Philip Gibbs and also that of Gedney Clarke, one of our

well documented characters.

Three couples, the Gordons, Adcocks and Wrenns wished to know if Stede Bonnett our most famous (notorious) pirate had really lived here and we could show them records of his life. They in turn supplied us with photos of his memorial in North Carolina and also pictures of the river area where his final battle was fought, before he was captured and hanged.

It subsequently was learned that Colonel Rhett, Mrs. Gordon's ancestor, was the man sent to capture Stede Bonnett, and that an ancestor of the Wrenn couple was the foreman of the jury which condemned Stede to be hanged.

We are now awaiting a visit from a descendant of the lady who placed a bouquet of flowers in Stede's hands when he was about to be hanged.

Recently author Sean O'Callaghan has been digging into our records of Cromwell's Irish prisoners who were sent to Barbados. His research will provide information for a book on that period.

SPOTLIGHT

Pottery by Bill Grace

Guest artist for our December exhibition will be one of the island's outstanding potters, Bill Grace.

Known for his exquisite porcelain vases and bowls, Bill will afford collectors and fans the chance to see more of that type of ware as well as the new pieces which he nonchalantly calls his 'wall plaques'.

From his description though, they re much more than that, as each plaque will combine 3-dimensional relief work with applied painted surface design. The results promise to be somewhere between painting and sculpture, and quite unique to our experience. Most of these will be mounted and framed, and may provide a unique and thoughtful gift for someone at Christmas.

This exhibition runs from December 4th (same day as the Museum's Fine Craft Festival) and continues until January 3rd, 1994.

Ken Keen'S Photographs

Promising to be one of the most exciting photographic shows to come to Barbados in recent times, Ken Keen's exhibition 'The Barbados Edition' runs from October 30th until November 26th at the Barbados Museum.

Ken who considers himself as much a printer as a photographer, is from the United Kingdom and plans to retire in Barbados. His eighty highquality, black and white prints represent a 'pictorial interpretation' of various aspects of the island and its people over a period of 15 years.

What makes this collection outstanding and certainly different from standard travelogues and photo-essays? It is perhaps the artist/photographer's ability and talent to capture and manipulate everyday, even mundane images, and present them from unique perspectives.


Also striking are the intensely rich tonal qualities which Keen uses to convey a sense of depth and of

texture. It is the interplay of these very elements with the subject matter, which elevates his photography from merely being a method of documenting information, to being an art form.

We hope you'll come and decide for yourself.
