
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

Fashions at the Museum




what my work entails, how I could contribute to the summit, how I expected to benefit from such a conference. After all the writing, there was the preparatory reading on the five topics to be discussed - the literature was sent by the American Associations of Museums, the organisers of the conference. Discussion topics were Emergency Preparedness, Ecotourism, management of cultural property and the educational role of Museums.

This latter topic was the one on which I was invited to make a presentation at the plenary session on the first day of the conference. Needless to say I was tense and full of anxiety for I had never addressed such a large gathering, much less seen such an array of prestigious persons from international organisations such as UNESCO, IDB and ICOM.

Presentation

Happily, my speech was well received and I was very surprised when several people including the IDB representative congratulated me and asked for copies of my presentation.

My speech had a general Caribbean perspective based on the Museum's Educational Manual which was developed after a UNESCO-sponsored regional educational conference in Barbados in 1992. However, my more specific focus was



that of the Barbados Museum and its educational policy and activities.

I met several museum professionals from the Americas and the Caribbean. The Caribbean delegation was a particularly delightful group which exemplified the cultural and linguistic diversity in the region.

The Conference agenda kept everyone busy, but we all had some time to visit the craft markets and museums. My greatest thrill, however, was my visit to the rain forest, travelling at tree-top level by cable car, observing the variety of plants and animals. • PM No No McGeary.

Emergency Preparedness at the Museum

With the advent of the Hurricane Season, the staff of the Barbados Museum conducted its annual Emergency Preparedness Exercise on June 5,1998.

In the morning session staff were treated to a very informative seminar on fire prevention by Mr. Randolph Cox of the Barbados Fire Service. Mr. Cox with his very interactive approach, addressed fire prevention in the home and the work place, the correct tools needed for fire prevention, the correct techniques for fire extinguishing and the swiftest method to put out different classes of fire.

In the afternoon emphasis was placed on Hurricane Preparedness. A general staff meeting was held and staff members were updated on the amendments to the Hurricane Preparedness Plan as it related to the necessary steps to be taken at a "watch" and a "warning".

The staff was then divided into their specific core teams to examine the procedures for their specific areas of the Museum, each core team conducted inventories on their supplies and revised their action plan.

Report on Excavations at Newton

Doctoral candidate in Historical Archaeology Mr. Ray Pasquariello gave an interim report on Archaeological excavations at Newton Plantation on May 22,1998 in the Temporary Exhibition

In his presentation Mr.
Pasquariello, who has been involved in the project since 1993, gave some background information as to why Newton Plantation was chosen as a site.
According to him the Newton Plantation site is unique because of its size, location and the state of

preservation which existed (the fact that the land has not been ploughed since slavery). Therefore the site was intact.

Excavations

The goal of the excavations is to better understand the means by which

individuals were buried during slavery while underscoring the historical and cultural complexities of "African Culture".

The key findings thus far have been the skeletal remains of a 6-ft man

which are still intact, and the type of jewellery he was wearing (a beaded necklace and a brass-ring hoop on his finger).

Other finds include the skeletal remains of a number of children and adolescents, and a large grave where multiple skeletons were found.

Ray also highlighted some of the challenges of the excavations which included two bush fires which destroyed a

number of the artifacts found. The excavations will be completed in August of this year when a number of the skeletal remains and artifacts will be taken to the United States to be scientifically tested.

Mr. Pasquariello took the opportunity at the end of the lecture to thank the Barbados Museum, the Historical Archaeology class at the University of the West Indies, and Mr. George Godson the land surveyor who assisted him.






Polytechnic and Museum work together




The class of Carpentry students who assisted the Museum. At far left Instructor Mr. Lowe, at far right Instructor Mr. Hurley.


Fine Craft Festival coming


The 1998 Fine Craft Festival is now in its planning stages. The date has been confirmed for December 5, 1998.
