
Improving the "African"


Museum receives funding to expand its African Gallery

he Barbados Museum has recently received funding from United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) to develop and expand the African Gallery. The project is being co-

ordinated by an advisory committee which includes museum staff, Museum council members Kathleen Drayton and Nancy Jacobs, and representatives from the University of the West Indies History Department, Dr. Alvin Thompson and Dr. Richard Goodridge.

The goal is to provide a permanent exhibition gallery where the central theme focuses on the continent of Africa





The provision for grant funding for the redevelopment of the African Gallery encompasses the main areas of design, interpretation and security of the collection. There is now the opportunity to create a much im-

proved permanent exhibition gallery where the central theme focuses on the continent of Africa by providing an overview of Africa's historical development and its cultural diversity.

Re-development

The aim of the gallery redevelopment, according to Kevin Farmer, Assistant Curator for History and Archaeology, is "to educate the viewer as to the environmental, cultural, societal and political diversity of the African continent, and its relationship to the creation of an African Diaspora."

Another aim of the gallery is the demystifying of the African continent, its people and culture. The main themes are technological adaptation, ports of departure and "10,000 years of African Civilisation." •




Thematic design for African gallery

Gallery, the Museum played host to Dr. E. Kofi Agorsah, a professor in Black, Caribbean and International Studies at Portland State University. Dr. Agorsah is a native of Ghana and was on a five-day consultancy to assist in the thematic concept of the Gallery and the identification of artifacts. He worked closely with Assistant Curator Kevin Farmer in creating a strategy for the reorganisation of the gallery and providing information on the objects and their cultural significance.

Archaeology

Dr. Agorsah has been living in the United States for seven years. He is an archaeologist by profession and is presently researching the maroons. He was responsible for the establishment of the archaeological programme at the University of the West Indies, Mona Campus, where he lived for a short time. He was also the Director of the Cape Coast Museum in Ghana and the Ghana National Museum.



Dr. Agorsah believes that there is not enough connection between Africa and the Caribbean, which leads to miseducation and little interaction. He however sees the Barbados Museum African Gallery as a step in the right direction in the Caribbean in educating the public on the African Continent. ❖

Excavations at Spring Garden

Excavation work on Spring Garden began in response to a call from museum member, Mr. Bruce Jardine, alerting the museum to the destruction of a site. A survey of the site revealed potstacks and the remains of human skeletal material at the southern end. The excavation was done in four phases and several persons assisted at various times: Mr. Kevin Farmer of the Barbados Museum, Dr. Karl Watson of the U.W.I., Dr. Ronald Hinds and Mr. Bruce Jardine. Excavation equipment was kindly donated by Mr. Peter Allard.

It seems that at the time of the first occupation, the site probably consisted of a raised sand stone beach within a very large bay, next to a river. It was difficult to say what the original landscape was like, since so much of the area has been lost due to clearance for building construction.

The recovery of the potstacks at the site can assist in understanding how widespread this type of 'technology' was on the island. The information could also indicate changes in technique and types of materials used in the construction of the pots.

Judging from the shape of the sherds found, it seems that the pots at this site were large and bell-shaped. There was also a significant number of both decorated and undecorated sherds associated with the pot stacks. The information yield could also indicate changes in the type of material and techniques used in their construction. There was a substantial amount of undecorated pottery amongst the pot stacks, but there were also some interesting decorative motifs on sherds associated with them. •

IT training for Museum officers

useum curatorial and administrative staff underwent a three-day training workshop in database development conducted by Mrs. Lene Rold, a consultant in database development from the National Museum of Denmark. Mrs. Rold is a curator and senior scientist at the National Museum of Denmark and has specialised in database development and collection management.

While in Barbados she was commissioned by the National Art Gallery Committee (NAG) and the Barbados Museum & Historical Society to initiate training in the development of databases for the newly found NAG and to evaluate the existing databases at the Museum. She also conducted a seminar in this subject area at the Ministry of Education for officers in the cultural industries.

Database development

Mrs. Rold is very well versed in the field of combining museum disciplines with Information Technology. She holds a Ph.D. in Archaeology and a degree in Computer Science. At the National Museum of Denmark she manages the department responsible for database development and for the maintenance of the collection's database.

An advocate for the development of databases in museums, she believes that they play an important role in assuring the sharing of information between museums and with museum audiences. While in Barbados Mrs. Rold laid the foundation for database development in the museum and related cultural industries. Feedback from museum staff was that the seminar and workshops were extremely interesting and informative. Mrs. Rold was complimented for her teaching skills and wide knowledge. •

Camp brings heritage to life

This year counsellors met for training at various times with Ms. McGeary in order to make this camp a success, and it was.

Our counsellors were fully prepared and quite capable of working with the children. Camp counsellors

included UWI graduates, primary school teachers and high school students. Special mention must be made of Ms. Peggy McGeary who created an exciting program for the campers and Erica Hewitt-Smith, Camp supervisor, who worked with Ms. McGeary in making the camp a success.

For the duration of the camp, the children worked on compiling information and drawings for their folders, based on various tours. Tours included the Garrison area, where campers viewed the remaining military buildings, including St. Ann's Fort, the Main Guard and Charles Fort.

Visits were made to several buildings and sites which were discussed for their historic significance and architectural features. Some of these were St. Nicholas Abbey, Farley Hill Great House, Codrington College, the Jewish Synagogue and the Parliament buildings.

This year's campers were easily motivated and a pleasure to work with. The Museum looks forward to next year's camp which promises to be something special. •







1999 Journal coming soon






