

Conservators evaluate museum fine art collection OCIETY.

assessment of selections from the institution's print and painting collections was carried out by two consultant art conservators from Puerto Rico. This survey has long been in our plans - tying in to the specific objectives of our conservation programme, and the overall objectives of our collections management policy and its on-going implementation. It was undertaken to ensure that our existing - and potential resources for conservation (i.e. human, financial, structural and informational), will be used with best effect to meet the institution's current and future needs.

A random selection of approximately 50 pieces, works from both areas were included, as well as some works already earmarked earlier for conservation treatment.

The conservators who hail from Puerto Rico, Mr. Luis Larrazabal and Ms. Lydia Aravena, were recommended by the Director Ms. Cummins on the basis of their expertise and wide experience in the field of art conservation, and are therefore acquainted with regional conditions.

Mr. Larrazabal who specializes in 'works on paper' (prints, drawings, and any paintings on paper), runs his own establishment, the Centre for the Investigation of the Conservation of Cultural Patrimony in the southern city of Ponce, P.R.


Ms. Aravena has been the Director of the Conservation Laboratory of Works of Art at the Ponce Art Museum for the last fifteen years. The range of her professional duties and involvement in the field of conservation include not only hands-on work, but training, planning, supervision, undertaking consultancies for public and private collections, lecturing, and publishing.

Survey

The survey, which took up two days, was facilitated by curators Kevin Farmer and Lesley Barrow-Whatley, as well as the museum's technical staff, in the identification and movement of the pieces between their existing locations and the two areas where the consultants worked. The curators also assisted with the recording and retrieval of supporting documentation for each work under inspection.

A post-mortem was held between the consultants and the curatorial staff to discuss immediate areas of concern, current collections maintenance needs and practices, as well as plans for short-term remedial steps to continue or implement.

Assistant Cherrie Parris has continued the process by carrying out short-term recommendations including

discarding old backing and hardware, cleaning frames and replacing pieces with acid/free or archival-quality materials, removing fragile items from display. In addition, she is pressing on to complete the arduous task of collating records to complete the cataloguing process, and ultimately the set-





up of the collection's database.

One might wonder what is the purpose and benefit of embarking on such an exercise?

In fact the predecessor of this particular survey was a much more extensive one carried out 4 years ago on objects from all the other collections except the Fine Arts and Natural History collections. It was funded by a grant from the Getty Conservation

Institute and provided us with the critical information on 'where we are' and 'where we need to go' with respect to the condition of the objects, the environments in which they are housed or stored, and the issues affecting their safety and care.

Survey

Likewise, the current conservation survey will serve a similar purpose. The conservators' object reports, visual files, estimates for treatment, recommendations affecting policies, practices and training needs are invaluable in terms of knowing what we have, and assisting us with how and where we need to go. Collectively, these types of records provide a blue-print for the collections they serve, and as such are integrated at three levels; 1) daily and month-to month collections care and planning, 2) annual budgeting, scheduling and programming, and lastly 3) the Museum's own triennial strategic plan.

Volunteers receive talk on culture

- Dr. Allyson Leacock highlights the work of the NCF

At the invitation of the Education Department and Docent Representative Jeanette Springer, Dr. Allyson Leacock CEO of the National Cultural Foundation treated the Barbados Museum volunteers to a talk on the role and work of the NCF in developing Barbadian Culture. Dr. Leacock, a recent member of the Museum's council, stated that she was very pleased to have the opportunity to speak to the volunteers about the NCF.

Dr. Leacock focused on the importance of culture and the cultural industries on Barbadian development, and the critical role the NCF's plays in the co-ordination of cultural programs and activities and facilitating cultural avenues for the youth of the island.

National Cultural Foundation

Dr. Leacock gave a comprehensive overview of the NCF's mandate and its organisational structure. She also reported on the new developments to come on stream for the national festivals in 2000.

In addition, of great importance to Dr. Leacock was the alliance between the Barbados Museum and the NCF. She advocated how both institutions could utilise each other's resources for the development of specific programmes and activities, such as the Museum's Fine Craft Festival and for technical assistance from the Museum for curatorial training for NCF Visual Arts Officers.

Questions were posed to Dr. Leacock on the importance of oral history to culture and the role of culture in Tourism. Miriam Kennedy thanked Dr. Leacock for her insightful presentation and invited her to return and speak to the volunteers at another time.

Update on Darwin Initiative Project

Cherrie Parris was pleased to report the successful completion of the first phase of the project, "Coral Reef Biodiversity in the Caribbean: A School's Project" and the publication of the activities-based, issue focused environmental education resource package entitled "People and Corals".

The next phase involves the testing of the resource package in five selected primary schools, and to this end ten teachers have been selected to attend a training workshop which aims to assist the teachers in the effective use of the pack - with its cross-curricula, active learning approach to environmental education. We will also be providing continued support to the teachers as they trial the resource pack in their various schools, in the third term of the current school year.

Testing Period

The information gained from this testing period will be utilised in the re-editing of the resource material, which will occur in the latter half of this year. We hope that this preliminary testing before the final publication (slated for January 2001) will enhance our final product.

The schools involved in the trial of the resource package are All Saint's Primary, Hindsbury Primary, Society Primary, St. James Primary and St. Joseph Primary.

The Darwin Initiative Project is a programme on Coral Reef Biodiversity in the Caribbean. The project is supported by the U.K. Department of the Environment Transport and the Regions. The goal of the programme is to increase student awareness of biodiversity and coral reefs as a resource through the development of resource packs in schools. • Cherrie Parris, Assistant Curator Natural History

Sir Donald a true conservationist

he passing of Sir Donald Wiles late in 1999 saddened the Council, members and staff of The Barbados Museum & Historical Society. Sir Donald had an active, varied career, and used his love for heritage to contribute to the development of this area in Barbados.

Sir Donald had a close association with the Barbados Museum where he served as honorary librarian of the Society. He became a member in January of 1946 and was elected to the Museum Council in 1956 where he gave dedicated service to this institution for 16 years, holding the post of Treasurer from 1973-1976. Sir Donald Wiles was made an honorary member for his longstanding service to the institution in 1999.

Sir Donald was also a founding member of the Barbados National Trust. It was at a meeting of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society that a decision was made that something should be done to preserve the old Barbadian houses which were being destroyed, hence the establishment of the Barbados National Trust.

Sir Donald was described as a consummate "preservationist

and conservationist." His career began as a teacher at Harrison College in 1930, where he worked until 1944 following which he attended the University of Toronto to pursue studies in Library Science. On his return to Barbados, he became the public librarian and between 1950-1954 he was assistant Colonial Secretary. In 1960 he became the Secretary of the Barbados National Trust and in 1976 he was elected President of the Trust. The Barbados Museum is very honoured to have benefited from the work of Sir Donald Wiles especially in the growth of the Shilstone Memorial Library.

Museum remembers Lady Jeanne Dear

The Council and Staff of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society learnt of the death of Lady Jeanne Dylis Dear. Lady Dear, an ardent supporter of the Museum and its programmes was married to the past president of the Museum, Sir Jack Dear.

Lady Dear married Sir Jack Dear on the 24th September 1949 in Trinidad and moved to Barbados shortly after. She was a trained Nurse (obtaining her accreditation from Guys Hospital in London, England) was the mother of three, Clyde, Wendy and Graham and the grandmother of three.





Fresh perspective for African Exhibit

be daunting - especially where one is faced with an expansive and complex topic like Africa and her impact on and linkages to New World cultures i.e. the Caribbean.

Having secured an UNESCO grant, the Museum staff got down to the planning process by identifying the types of resources needed to take the project through from start to finish. The UNESCO grant allowed us to embark on several tasks. For a start, we were able to contract the services of two consultants - an archaeologist and university lecturer in African studies, Dr. Kofi Agorsah and Mr. Alex Castro, an architect who specializes in designing museum exhibits.

These professionals were brought in at ground -level to work closely with the curatorial team, because it was important from the out -set to identify and work on several issues. These included trying to resolve just what the exhibit's new educational objectives were; the target groups and their needs, the thematic scope and subject matter; as well as 'visioning' the exhibit and clarifying the subject matter into concrete modules.

Besides our on-going dialogue and contact with Dr. Agorsah and Mr. Castro, a number of things have progressed with respect to the developments of the exhibit. For one, we have made strides in identifying and updating the cataloguing of our existing collection of African artifacts. In addition, the prospect of expanding our collection both for general as well as specific needs is enabled by using some of the grant to purchase objects on the market. To this end, we are contacting overseas auction houses, and dealers specialising in African art and objects. In addition to potential purchases, two museums - the National Museum of African Art of the Smithsonian Institution, and the Decker Institute in Curacao, have stated their willingness to consider providing long term loans from their own collections.

Advisory Group

The Advisory group to the project has also had an active role to play. Each member as well as some of the staff, agreed last December to research and write on a specific topic in their field of expertise. The sections have since been submitted to the curator working on compilation and drafting of the text. Another member of the Advisory group agreed to undertake the editing of the final draft so that it avoids

being 'too specialised, ambiguous, detailed, lengthy or even condescending.' The group will soon meet again to look at the final draft critically. One item which will be discussed is the sequencing of the exhibit (i.e. past -to -present or familiar-to-unfamiliar or vice-versa) and its effectiveness in stimulating and affecting the visitors.

Once the text is finalised, graphic material selected and decisions made with respect to the actual artefacts being included, the exhibit designer will return once again to go through all the imputs with the curatorial team: content, technical and design considerations, available resources (human, time, financial), the conservation and environmental constraints, and programming needs. Only then can he go to work on designing the entire presentation and submitting the specifications and plans.

Finally, in looking ahead to the completion of the new installation, the curators have already met with the education and marketing officers, to brain-storm about the development of more creative approaches to the marketing and educational programming of the gallery - both at its launching and after it is up and running. •




Slavery

The story of "Old Doll" is one of a strong willed woman and her daughters; it details their struggle against slavery. It is a moving story of the reality of life on a Barbadian plantation at the end of the eighteenth century, which clearly shows that slavery did not simply pit white against black but was instead, far more complex.

The Rewriting History Series is a series of popular pamphlets produced as a result of a partnership between The Department of History of the University of the West

Indies (Cave Hill Campus) and the Barbados Museum & Historical Society. The series is inspired by the belief that no society can develop without an understanding of its history. This series confronts the stereotypes to stimulate a reassessment of Caribbean Social and Cultural History. The Nation Publishing Co. Ltd., kindly sponsors this project.
