

Museum mounting exhibition on Holetown

The Barbados Museum participated in the 2002 Holetown Festival with the mounting of a temporary exhibition on Holetown, entitled, The Land Marks 375 Years of Holetown. This exhibition, curated by Alison Headley, commemorated the anniversary of the first settlement in this historical area by using landmarks in Holetown to tell the story of its history. The exhibition looked at the first visit by Europeans to Barbados in 1625, the first settlers in Holetown and also highlighted the changing face of Holetown including the Holetown Festival.

Plans progressing for slavery museum

The Museum contracted the services of Dr. Curtis Jacobs, historian in Caribbean Studies and Mr. James Marshall, research assistant, to carry out research on the museum.

Publication and lecture on Archaeology coming

The Barbados Museum & Historical Society will be publishing a book on the archaeology of prehistoric Barbados, written especially for the wider public. The text of this publication entitled "Amerindian Stories: An Archaeology of Early Barbados" by Dr. Peter Drewett, is centered around nine short stories, eight reconstructions of aspects of Amerindian life and the last based on the archaeologist's story looking for that life. We meet Wa'kuku as she arrives on Barbados around 2000 BC and Wao Wao Liem born as the dog barked all night. Following each story is the archaeological evidence and a rich selection of original colour photos of archaeological discoveries from Barbados, with images from the Carib Reservation in Dominica and elsewhere, to bring the discoveries alive. Based largely on some twenty archaeological excavations undertaken by the author in Barbados over the last eighteen years, the book brings Amerindian Barbados to life. The book is the second in a series, the first book being "Geology of Barbados" and both are recommended for all ages. Members can expect copies of the new edition to be on sale from April 2002.

College London and during 1999-2000 was visiting Professor of Archaeology, at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. The author of eight books and over ninety articles, he has lectured across the world from Hong Kong to Washington State and from Canada to Venezuela. In 1984 he set up the Barbados Archaeological survey project in conjunction with the Barbados Museum & Historical Society, which has led to a fruitful collaboration over the last eighteen years.





Remembering Carolyn Barrow

Carolyn Barrow was born in New Jersey USA, the only daughter of the Rev. George Plaskett and Mrs. Plaskett. Carolyn was the first black female student at Oberlin, a liberal arts College in Ohio and afterwards she attended Parsons School in New York. Carolyn worked in Paris and London. It was during her stay in Canada that she met a dashing Barbadian airman with the Royal Air Force, and married him. Errol Barrow took his bride back to Barbados via London. After establishing a law practice, Errol Barrow entered politics and became the first Prime Minister of Independent Barbados.

Carolyn, with her broad liberal educational background and international work experience and equipped with an independent mind, wit and

charm, became involved with broadcasting with Rediffusion, interior decorating, portrait painting and dress design. All these talents made Carolyn a gracious first lady, supportive of her husband and our newly independent Nation.

I met Carolyn through the Museum shop in which she took such an avid interest. She was also a Museum member for over 25 years. There was always an atmosphere of caring and fun when Carolyn was around. To her children and family we all offer our sympathy on the death of a person with such rare spirit.

A tribute to the late George Brancker

The Board, Director and staff of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society was shocked and saddened by the news of the passing of the late George Eustace Theodore Brancker CBE. Mr. Brancker was a strong supporter of the Museum for over 25 years. He had a love for history and we at the Museum treasured his insight, articulate interventions and wonderful sense of humour.

Mr. Brancker who was a 1956 Barbados scholar, started his parliamentary service as a deputy clerk in November 1970 and acted as clerk from 1977-1979. He was appointed to the post in 1982. Brancker was responsible for redrafting the current Standing Orders, the rules that govern proceedings in the two Houses of Parliament. In 1996 his outstanding service to parliament was recognised when he was

Sneak peak at new African Gallery

Due to capital works at the Museum we will be unable to accommodate any public programming for the month celebrating Black History. However we will be collaborating with the Division of Fine Arts at the Barbados Community College to observe a special week of activities. The week of activities proposes to highlight the theme "**African Connections 2002**" and will start on February 25, 2002 with the opening of an exhibition of African Art and artifacts in the gallery at Morningside.

African Gallery

This exhibition in conjunction with the Barbados Museum & Historical Society will provide a sneak peak into the Museum's new African Gallery which is to be opened. The exhibition runs from February 25, 2002 until Saturday, March 2,2002 at 4:00 p.m.

Another main event during the week will be a lecture by noted art historian Professor Judith Bettleheim of San Francisco State University in California. She is the co-editor of the book 'Caribbean Festival Arts', the product of an exhibition which she co-curated, where she demonstrated the cultural roots and diversities of the African heritage and how it has been transformed in the multi cultural Caribbean.

New look Warmington gallery coming soon

Members can expect to see a new look Warmington Gallery in a few months. The gallery is being redesigned to take into consideration the recommendations of the Getty Report of 1995. The work being done includes:

Renovations and repair of the existing roof
Renovation and repair of the existing walls and floor
The environmental and conservation issues facing this gallery are also being addressed since there are new plans for improved environmental control and new lighting apparatus.

A review of the gallery is also being done with an aim at improving the visitor experience. The gallery will be converted into a walk through exhibit or showcase with the three rooms having a glass wall to make them separate into their own exhibit case. New lighting will also be installed along with a humidifier which will assist with achieving a stable environment. Of major importance is the incorporation of pieces from the Connell gallery into the Warmington gallery.


