Museum reopens Warmington

The Barbados Museum recently officially reopened its period rooms known as the Warmington Gallery, after eight months of renovation and refurbishment to the building. The gallery was reopened after the Annual General Meeting on September 18, 2002 by the President of the Society, Dr. Trevor Carmichael.


Guests were able to view a short five minute video on the dismantling of the Warmington Gallery, especially to see the technical aspect of this very sensitive job.

The gallery showcases the environment, mood and setting of a traditional plantation house, spanning the period of the mid 18th - 19th centuries. The goal was to remove irrelevant items in each of the former rooms to create rooms of the same period. \square

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
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C'bean Records makes donation to BMHS

The Barbados Museum & Historical Society has been presented with some of the equipment used in the production of vinyl records in Barbados. The presentation was made to Ms. Alissandra Cummins, Director of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society at the factory of Caribbean Records Barbados Limited, formerly West Indies Records Limited (WIRL), in Applewhaites St. Thomas, by Mr. Bunny Best, Managing Director of Caribbean Records Barbados Ltd and former Sales and Production Manager of WIRL.

The material presented included the dye used to make both 45 and LP Records, vinyl pellets and one of the presses for the manufacture of the LP records. Records presented to the Museum included the fourth local 45 record made, called 'A Still Small Voice' by Herman 'Soul' Forde and the last LP, Krosfyah's 'Lockdown'.

The Barbados Museum is extremely pleased to acquire not only examples of this sound technology but also records of the early music industry. The Council, Director and Management of the Barbados Museum extends sincere thanks to Mr. Best and his team for this important donation.

The Ann Yates Memorial Collection

The Barbados Museum was extremely please to receive on permanent loan from the estate of Mrs Ann Yates 'The Ann Yates Memorial Collection', which consist of one album of Barbadian postcards. This presentation was made by her husband Mr. Alan Yates on August 12, 2002.

Mrs. Yates was born in Barbados in 1937 and spent her childhood in Barbados. She was an inveterate collector and built up over many years a large collection of maps, prints, engravings, postcards and photographs of Barbados. This collection of photographs and postcards inevitably led to the publication of her first book 'Bygone Barbados.' She also loved to spin absorbing tales for her children and grandchildren, this led to two other books 'Side by Side' and 'Rhyme and Reason.' She died in December 2001

after battling cancer for eight years. Her family felt in fitting that her collection of Old Barbadian postcards be returned for safe-keeping to her beloved country of birth. \square



A look at the new Warmington

As part of the capital works slated for the 2001-2002 period, plans were made for the deinstallation of the Warmington Gallery during February 2002, to facilitate the structural changes to be made to the buildings and roofs by April 2002. As a result of the several changes, these major renovations concluded during late May 2002.

The previous Warmington Gallery contained three rooms, with the living and dining room combined. The idea was to remove irrelevant items in each of the rooms to create spaces of the same time period. Mr. John Chandler, previous owner of the Ocean View Hotel, who presently owns Fisherpond Plantation House, was contacted and appointed to assist in the redecoration of the Warmington Gallery because of his expertise in that area.

Main bedroom

The primary function of the main bedroom was to create a 'homey, lived in atmosphere.' The previous layout contained just over eighteen pieces of furniture and other objects and featured a predominant 'female presence'. The new room contains over twenty five artefacts with some very distinctive changes, including a fall front secretaire laden with unique paper weights and other items specifically catering to a man's writing needs.

The nursery has been transformed into a little girl's room, and items, particularly dolls and other toys were selected. Replicas of 18th and 19th century lamps were also installed to give a soft illumination.

Designed specifically for a dinner setting, the main focus of the dining room is to highlight the Farley Hill collection of ceramic ware on the dining table and the exquisite collection of ceramic and glass artistically laid out in four cases. The living and dining rooms are now divided by an invisible line, by two small upholstered foot stools, an upholstered armchair, a

regency stool, tip top card table and an oval marble Victoria table.

Visitors can view the entire gallery from the inside as well as from the outside, through a specifically made glass, which when installed, will allow visitors to actually walk part way into each of the rooms. The gallery will be open to the public in the near future.

Museum to host lecture and launch of book on Caribbean antique furniture



Digest' and 'Art and Antiques.' He lives in New York City and St. Croix.



The Male Popaw Tree, Griffith Hughes, 1750


Students learn about the museum profession

This summer the Museum welcomed two students from the Barbados Community College for a summer attachment programme, Mr.Jermain Beckford and Mr. Brian Harris who spent 12 weeks with the Barbados Museum. The two students are pursuing Associate degrees in History and Economics and were assigned to work under the supervision of Assistant Curator, History & Archaeology, Mr. Kevin Farmer and Research Assistant James Marshall.

Photograph collection

Jermaine was assigned to record the photograph collection, obtaining dimensions and placing the photographs in Mylar sleeves, while Brian conducted an inventory of the document collection, specifically the legal documents of J.T. Haynes. His responsibility was to wrap these documents in acid free paper and record information such as subject headings etc. Brian also completed the inventory case, comprising stamps and First Day Covers as well as numerous plantation records.

Both interns obtained training in proper handling, preventative conservation and care of documents by

Empowering the nation through information

Below is an excerpt from the keynote address given by Alissandra Cummins, Director of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society on the occasion of the Library Association of Barbados Library Week Seminar entitled 'Empowering the Nation Through Information.'

A common concern for many of us in the business of information creation or provision is what may be perceived as the enduringly particular and special character of localised cultures in the face of a generally presumed globalism, engendered by the all- pervasive communications onslaught and the ramifications of international capitalism. The supposed hegemony of global brands and the myth of democratisation of travel are everywhere undetermined by continued culture diversity and the still insistently sedentary nature of the global population as a whole. More than anything else, cultures retain essentialist images of self-identity based on place. This is true even in cases of geographical displacements of groups.

Nation State

There are few regions of the world where migration has become such an integral part of peoples existence as the Caribbean.

This gives legitimacy to the notion that the examination of the processes of migration, colonization, exile, assimilation, destruction, evaluation and reconstruction of identity must be central to our work today, not least because of the concept of nation state as it is shared, observed and interpreted by a single group fuelled by information which has been gathered over time and identified as essential truths about ourselves and our country, is the key social, economic and political agenda which shapes our national identity.

Information for me means the provision of knowledge about ourselves for and by ourselves. In other words the 'creation and delivery of information' which meets our needs and expectations as a people. We must therefore take the responsibility for accessing and evaluating data that enables us to form our own history out of which our collective identity is forged. These are factors which tend to define us as a people, provide us with a cultural identity: Culture to arrive at in simplest definition is a way of life of a people.

Diversity

The World Commission on Culture and Development Report of 1995 entitled, 'Our Creative Diversity,' says that culture is a whole complex of distinctive spiritual, material, intellectual and emotional features. It includes creative expression, oral history, language, literature, preforming arts, fine arts and crafts, community practice, traditional healing methods, traditional natural resources. The cultural and natural heritage thus provides a sense of identity and helps to differentiate communities in a climate of globalisation. It allows cultural communities to discover and understand one another and, at the same time, constitutes a development asset.

Audience

If we want to examine the information about Barbados available to an international audience, the highly respected United National Development Programme Human Development Report recently launched for 2002, where Barbados' current status as one of the most successful internationally as a developing country and small state, is strikingly contrasted with the Discover Barbados Website of the Barbados Tourism Authority which provides visitors with a very different perspective.

Barbados' history as presented through this medium is virtually unrecognisable, not to say inaccurate.

In a recent address Nobel Laureat Professor Wole Soyinka pointed out that 'culture is a matrix of infinite possibilities and choices.' He says, 'from within the same cultural matrix, we can extract arguments and strategies of degradation or ennoblement, for enslavement or liberation for the suppression of productive potential of the enhancement.' Culture is about choices and identity and is in a large part the end result of that selection process, and information is more often than not the vehicle which fuels the process of creation of identity.


Preserving Barbados' heritage and ensuring access to it depends as much on the accuracy of its documentation and interpretation of collections as on the conservation of the objects themselves.

Preservation

These are issues that we need to face in this new millennium. What is crucial, as we think about culture and development, is to recognise that the maintenance of heritage, of culture, of individual history, is a mandatory building block on which development with countries and within our globe needs to occur. The preservation of that culture is not an optional extra. It is an essential element in the development process.

We have a responsibility, as a result of this meeting, to take the message and try and make people understand that heritage is not an adornment, heritage is not a luxury, heritage is not elitism. Rather heritage is a critical information and investments asset, heritage is humanity.


Exhibition on Independence
