BMHS commence major capital works

From March 2003, physical redevelopment will begin on the new African Gallery. Plans are in place to expand the physical size of the gallery from 200 square feet to 800 square feet. The physical redevelopment will include, raising the roof of the existing gallery for better ventilation, creating a new physical structure for the gallery and dismantling the Connell gallery. This is of major historical significance for the museum since this is the first gallery to be deinstalled at the museum.


The Connell gallery was opened on November 29,1974 in memory of Mr. Neville Connell. Objects and artifacts from this gallery have now been incorporated into the newly redesigned Warmington and Cunard galleries.

This redevelopment of the museum's west wing is the major capital works project for the Barbados Museum in 2003. The curatorial department has been busy deinstalling the galleries while conducting an inventory of the collections.

Objective

Phase II of this project will include the creation of an inner wall, followed by fabrication, production of the gallery and installation of the new African gallery. The objective of this project is to increase the scope of the existing African gallery to provide a broader representation of the history and culture of this African continent, as well as to educate and provide innovative ways to teach the general public about the continent of Africa.

The new gallery will be called Connections: Africa and its people in the Caribbean and will fall under the themes of Africa the Continent, Dawn of civilisation, Kingdoms and Power, Trade and commerce and Africa in the Caribbean.


Exhibition to celebrate Bridgetown anniversary

Objectives




Bridgetown Early: The story of Bridgetown

Caribbean Elegance Experience a success

The Barbados Museum was very honored to host Dr. Michael Connors, author of the Book Caribbean Elegance. Dr. Connors visited the island from December 17-21, 2002 to launch this book. The launch included a 45 minute lecture, a book signing and cocktail reception. Many antique enthusiasts were extremely delighted to be part of this event where Dr. Connors discussed the historical significance of Caribbean furniture and highlighted many of the unique features of Caribbean furniture from the French, Dutch and Spanish Caribbean. The newly renovated Warmington Gallery was also open for viewing.

The Assistant Curator for Art Ms. Allison Headley worked closely with Dr. Connors. During his stay on the island they toured many of the island's plantation houses and other private residences including Francia Plantation, Fisherpond House and St. Nicholas Abbey to observe the various types of



furniture. While at the Museum, Dr. Connors assisted Ms. Headley with dating and clarifying some of the information on the furniture in the Warmington Gallery. The Barbados Museum is hoping to plan another lecture by Dr. Connors later this year. •



Specially invited guests included Barbados Museum Council members and editor of the Journal of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society, Dr. Karl Watson.


Independence


Museum bids farewell to Jenny

Mrs. Kennedy has input over 3000 entries which has been a major accomplishment to date and she hopes that eventually all of the Barbados Museum's databases will be amalgamated to provide one comprehensive database.

Training

Jenny commented that she has found the work at the Barbados Museum truly fascinating, in particular the historical documents. As her departure time draws closer, she is now in the process of completing this mammoth task and is presently sorting and entering the newspaper clippings

The History of B'dos' music recording industry

Please find below a speech given by Mr. Bunny Best, Managing Director of Caribbean Records Barbados Ltd. formerly Wirl Records Limited (WIRL) which documents the history of the Music recording industry in Barbados. The speech was given during a presentation by Caribbean Records Ltd. to the Barbados Museum.

The history documented below spans some 38 years.

Good morning we have invited you here today to witness and document the historic occasion that will end the pressing of vinyl records in Barbados after 38 years and 9 months of operation.

Mannings of Broad street who later amalgamated with the Barbados Shipping & Trading Co. Ltd. were the local agents for several record distributors. Their two directors Mr. Colin Thomas and Mr. Colin Wilkie recognised the need for installing a pressing plant on the island because of the demand for music. The company West Indies Records Barbados Limited (WIRL) was set up mainly to manufacture and distribute music throughout the Caribbean islands under franchise licensing agreements.

I joined the company in January 1965 when we started production with two labels EMI and DECCA Records Limited. Soon after Warner Brothers and Atlantic were added. With these labels came the release of rhythm and blues artists like Otis Redding, Percy Sledge, Sam Cook, Solomon Burke, Aretha Franklyn and the Beatles.

Radio

Radio Barbados had just started broadcasting from the Lazaretto in Black Rock and DJ Vic Brewster had this popular midday programme 'A Break with Brewster.' Needless to say as no local music was available

he was instrumental in having Richard Stoute, the Draytons Two and Herman Ford record two songs each of their own compositions at the Lazaretto Studio. These were done for broadcast and during the first playing of the tapes, Vic received a tremendous response and he then encouraged me to put them on record. We had the master stamps made in Miami. Those recordings were pressed on seven inch vinyl, they were all hits and that was the beginning of the local music industry.

Soon after I was travelling the Caribbean islands promoting the records of the international artists. By then the company was fulfilling the very important role of the development of our music culture here in Barbados and also every island in the Caribbean.

Local music

Mr. Winston Leach joined the company as plant manager and together we continued to develop the local music industry. WIRL became the producer of all future recordings. We used the studio at Black Rock until they moved to the Pine location where, with better facilities more local artistes were recorded.

Since I visited every Caribbean island on a regular basis, it was my job to negotiate on behalf of WIRL With every musical group to record and manufacture their works in Barbados. This was very successful for us.

Within ten years WIRL was representing 15 international labels.

As a result the pressing plant was increased to 12 presses with a capacity of 15,000 records per day. The cassette plant was also added to the company which then had a staff of 58 employees. 1982 was the most challenging year for Winston Leach and myself. As we had several hit records of the international artistes to supply along with LP orders for Trinidad Carnival. As the saying goes nothing lasts forever and the cassettes began to erode the sale of records.

Pirating

Another issue was the pirated compilation. This trend took a serious toll on the record market. By the late 1980s the CD format was developed and there was a further decline in vinyl sales. After a fire at WIRL in 1995 and because of my love for the business I purchased the vinyl and cassette plant from BS&T.

Four presses were salvaged from the fire and the company was restarted as Caribbean Records Barbados Ltd. Due to the demand for Compact Discs we also invested in a CD replicating plant capable of manufacturing over 1200 CDs daily. However we started to experience difficulty in sourcing the vinyl pellets and most of the record stores had ceased stocking vinyl, resulting in artists not releasing their music on that format.
