



The recent opening of the redesigned African Gallery has signified a high point for the Barbados Museum and Historical Society. This was renewed again on 23rd February when the gallery was selected as the venue to host the official visit from the President of Botswana, H.E. Mr Festus Mogae and the Prime Minister of Barbados, the Rt. Hon. Owen Arthur for the signing of a double taxation agreement and memorandum of understanding.

The Deputy Prime Minister, Senior Minister for Foreign Affairs and other Ministers were in attendance, as well as other specially invited guests from culture and arts organisations. President of the Society's Council, Dr. Trevor Carmichael gave a brief welcome address and later closed with the

formal presentation of a gift of a reproduction of the Ford map which dates from 1674, to President Mogae from the Society.



PROJECTS IN BRIEF

Tourism Seminar

Fresh Ideas & New Offers was attended on 24th February by the Marketing Officer and Assistant Curator - History. The seminar organised by the UK Trade & Investment Division of the British High Commission on behalf of the British Consultants & Construction Bureau (BCCB), focused on a range of skills and expertise available from the UK, relevant to the tourism sector in the Caribbean. The keynote address was delivered by Mr. Luther Miller of the Caribbean Tourism Organisation and participants included those from the NCC, NCF and University of the West Indies.

The seminar though mainly covering trade and services provided the opportunity for informal networking between seminar participants and the team assembled from the UK. Preliminary discussions were held between the Curator of the MCC Cricket Museum at Lords and the Assistant Curator - History as to a collaborative oral history project to create an audio archive of those involved in cricket, including players, administrators and spectators.


The outcomes of the networking, resulting from formal presentations and informal discussions proved very informative especially in relation to Regeneration and World Heritage Status. Presentations on Sustainable Tourism and Regeneration planning emphasized the need for management plans in maintaining historic buildings and consultation with all stakeholders before regeneration begins.

At the seminar both the National Trust and the Assistant Curator - History also drew attention to the proposed nomination of Bridgetown and its Historic Garrison for World Heritage Status. They also highlighted the importance of the warehouse district in Cavan's Lane and the Pierhead as integral in this nomination process and as the best examples of 18th and 19th century warehouses (along with smaller warehouses in Reid Street) in Bridgetown.

They further highlighted the importance of enabling legislation to protect both the historic built environment and the need for restoration appropriate to such buildings. In all the seminar proved worthwhile and new areas were covered for staff in learning about heritage tourism and ideas for marketing heritage products.








The OCLC homepage

Library Database

The Museum has recently been added to the OCLC (Online Computer Library Centre) database. The OCLC database is part of WorldCat which is a worldwide union catalog created and maintained collectively by more than 9,000 member institutions. This addition is a significant achievement for the Museum and the benefits of us being a member will mean someone searching the WWW using OCLC, GOOGLE or YAHOO will now be routed to materials in the Museum's Shilstone Memorial Library if there is a match in the search. Furthermore, the Shilstone Library will be revealed as one of the locations where information can be found. Technical Assistance

The Director welcomed twelve students from the UWI Masters Degree programme in Heritage Studies for their first session in the Museums studies course. Following their introduction to the history and development of museums and to Caribbean museums in general, students will be following an intensive five-week programme, which familiarizes them with various aspects of museum and heritage management and conservation. They will conduct site visits and evaluations of various museum and heritage sites, in preparation for practical application of their knowledge, resulting in comprehensive technical papers documenting the work undertaken.

Birds Booklet project with the Graeme Hall Nature Sanctuary

A partnership arrangement with the Graeme Hall Nature Sanctuary has enabled the production of a workbook for school children on the topic of birds. Funds for the printing of the workbook were provided by the Sanctuary while the educational content was conceptualised through a joint effort between the Museum's Education Officer and the Assistant Curator for Natural History. The workbook will be used as an educational resource by teachers to allow school children to learn about the numerous species of birds, and the habitats in which they live. 3,000 copies of the workbook will be printed for distribution.




ACTIVITIES AT THE MUSEUM

MUSEUM HIGHLIGHTS

January 2005

On Sunday 20th February, the Museum co-sponsored the fundraising event for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. The event was a jazz show highlighting a young, accomplished Barbadian vocalist, Rosemary Phillips backed by an experienced international band comprised of veteran Barbadian musicians and Francophone world's best jazz pianist, Mr.Charles Luce.

The 400 strong audience was entertained by both standard jazz classics and jazz interpretations of Barbadian folk and calypso. Messrs. Irving Burgie and Vern Best were also in attendance, as well as Her Excellency Mrs. Mary Kramer, U.S. Ambassador to Barbados and the Eastern Caribbean.

Preserving Paradise Lecture Series

The start of the Preserving Paradise lecture series (organised by the Museum and the Biological and Chemical Sciences Department of the University of the West Indies to commemorate the life and work of the late Dr. Colin Hudson) got off to a great start with Professor Sean Carrington delivering the first lecture with over 200 patrons in attendance. The second lecture in the series entitled "The Geology of Barbados" was delivered by Professor Hans Machel, an eminent geologist from the University of Alberta, Edmonton, generated equal interest amongst the community. Lively discussions on various environmental issues, followed the comprehensive 2 1/2 hour lecture. The third lecture was given by Dr. Leonard Nurse. There are three remaining lectures in the series, which concludes in May.




Prof. Hans Machel delivering his lecture on the "Geology of Barbados"




Prof. Hans Machel with participants from the geology bus tour.

f museums are to be effective as educational institutions, they must provide opportunities for all who might use them to learn at every stage of their educational development from early childhood to old age" (Anderson, D. 'A Common Wealth: Museums in the Learning Age)

Anderson further suggests that museums should cater to the communities in which they exist, and that while the gallery experience should be emphasized, "community programmes

may take museums beyond their natural physical and philosophical boundaries." This is seen as necessary if museums are to break down barriers to access for many non-visitors, including those from ethnic minorities."

The Education Department of the Barbados Museum caters mainly to the 'school' community from nursery level to university. The galleries are used to reinforce the topics in the History/Social Studies syllabus as well as some sections of the Science syllabus. The Harewood Gallery for example covers many environmental issues which affect the use of our natural resources (coral reefs, fishing, pollution, water) and these are important concepts which are reinforced at all levels of learning. Some museum staff members also visit schools in the various communities to give talks on a variety of topics which are requested.

Partnerships have been developed with educational institutions like Erdiston Teacher's Training College with a view to helping teachers understand how they can use the museum as an

There are also educational opportunities provided for the wider community/public who may visit and learn at their own pace in our galleries, those who may attend lectures which are offered on a variety of themes as well as those who prefer to both visit


> the gallery and then go on the Ole Time Excursion bus tour. This tour caters to what is referred to in the museum world as 'edutainment'- where people learn and have fun.

The Shilstone Memorial Library (now temporarily closed) offers immense opportunities to those involved in serious

research which may lead to publications from which the wider public may learn more.

The museum's journal is another educational tool which offers information on a wide range of topics. Published since 1933, the journal has been consistent in its effort to publish well researched material on the history, environment and culture of Barbados and the Caribbean.



NEW ACQUISTIONS

Amongst the items purchased at auction in October 2004, were three items to add to the Museum's History and Art collections. A shop scale with weights, an original (undated) oil painting entitled "St. Philip Pasture" by Nesta Bowen-Horne, and over 300 slides depicting both local and international scenes, with half of the slides depicting Carnival, Remembrance Day and Christmas in Barbados during 1958. The slides were accompanied by a documented inventory written by Ms. Mabel Haskell, who incidentally was the photographer and a former member of the council of the Museum.

St. Philip Pasture

The Museum preserves our history by collecting works particularly by local and regional artists. Nesta Bowen-Horne, was another Barbadian artist who recreated the Barbadian landscape, portraying unexpected viewpoints in familiar scenes using watercolors, oils and pastels. Other works currently in the collection include "Fat Pork Hill" and an "Untitled Seascape" both showcasing the theme of the environment.

Mabel Haskell Collection

The Museum is fortunate to have acquired such a large and varied collection of colored slides depicting local events during the late 1950's. Many of the museum's photographic collection of local events have been documented in the form of photographs and postcards.




PEOPLE CHANGES
