


People' was chosen by the International Council of Museums (ICOM) for International Museums Day on May 18, 2006. On this day, museums around the world hosted special programmes for or with young people.

The Barbados Museum also played its part in putting on a programme not only for 18th May but for the entire week.

From Monday 15th May through most of the week, visiting schools were treated to story telling by the Education Officer and some schools did a special project called "Games we Used to Play'. Several rhythm, skip-rope, line and ring games were taught." The Education Officer hopes to see a revival of some of the more "active games' in the schools and communities around the island.

After the museum tour and games, some children enjoyed the competitive Treasure Hunts which saw them racing from place to place, as new clues pointed them to where the treasure was hidden.

On 18th May, interviews were recorded by the Caribbean Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) with Education Officer, Peggy McGeary, and BMHS Director, Alissandra Cummins, who is also President of ICOM and the Chairperson of the National Art Gallery Committee.


On Friday 19th May, the staff joined ICOM's cultural celebration and enjoyed an evening "lime" in the Upper Courtyard.



Musée du Quai Branly


he BMHS Director was in Paris to be present for the June 20th inauguration by the French president of the Musée du Quai Branly, the city's biggest newly built museum since the futuristiclooking Pompidou Centre opened nearly 30 years ago. Musée du Quai Branly is devoted to the "art and civilisation of Africa, Asia, Oceania and the Americas".

Created by Jean Nouvel, designer of the Institut du Monde Arabe, also in Paris, and of the Torre Agbar in Barcelona, the Musée du Quai Branly has attracted lots of attention with its unique design. Outside, a horizontal row of two dozen large boxes are painted in earthy tones of aubergine, ochre and tan.

In addition, there is an unusual 800-square-metre "vegetation wall" - a vertical garden in which 150 different plant species have taken root on polyamide felt, stapled to waterproof PVC slabs and

fed by automatic hosepipes. Mr Nouvel said he wanted to create space organised around "the symbols of the forest, the river and the obsessions of death and oblivion".


The museum's permanent collection is made up of traditional artefacts, arranged mainly by geographical region - 300,000 objects, such as masks, stools, statues, musical instruments, textiles, costumes, jewellery, ceramics, ranging from familiar items to rare treasures.

AAM Annual Meeting & Museum Expo 2006

The BMHS Director, Alissandra Cummins, and the Marketing Officer, Christine Skeete, joined over 7,000 attendees at the 2006 American Association of Museums (AAM) Annual Meeting and Museum Expo in Boston from 27th April to 1st May to benefit from marketing-related sessions and meet suppliers for museumrelated services. As this was the centennial celebration of the AAM, the conference was coordinated to be a truly magnificent occasion. The theme was "A Centennial of Ideas: Exploring Tomorrow's Museums".

The Marketing Officer attended sessions on future marketing success for large and small museums, the latest evaluation techniques for online users, planned giving, and reaching success in museum retail. Social events such as the International Attendees Welcome Reception and the AAM/ICOM luncheon provided useful networking opportunities, while the Expo enabled Ms. Skeete to develop contacts with suppliers of innovative products and services. She also took advantage of her stay in a city known for its wealth of cultural institutions and visited the Museum of Fine Arts, Museum of Science, Harvard Art Museums and the Old State House Museum.

The Director also attended this meeting in her capacity as President of The International Council of Museums (ICOM). She gave a keynote address in recognition of the AAM's 100th anniversary, and attended the board meeting of the U.S. National Committee of ICOM, and addressed the annual general meeting of U.S. ICOM members. Ms. Cummins also attended the two-day conference of the new ICOM International Committee CAMOC, which was held conjunction with the AAM meeting on 1st to 2nd May, 2006.

60th Anniversary of ICOM






African Awareness


The BMHS Director addressing invited guests at the Opening Ceremony for African Awareness activities


Facilitator Mrs. Keturah Babb, as she gave one of the first presentations


- Better understand the reality of women and men and the implications of sex and gender stereotyping
- Identify barriers and obstacles men and women face as they attempt to

perform their multiple roles

- Understand the process by which policy is formulated and the extent to which these processes determine the achievement of national development goals
- The importance of incorporating gender into development policies
- Develop strategies that empower policy makers to incorporate gender in national policies, plans and projects.



Participants and facilitators during one of the interactive sessions discussing the topic "Understanding the Reality of Men and Women"




Staff Lime

Wedding & Honeymoon Show




The Museum's booth at the Wedding & Honeymoon Show

Transitions Exhibition



About Kathleen D. Bermai (c.1935 - 1996)

Rathleen D. Berman was born and educated in London where she studied art at The Central School of Arts and Crafts. She gained the National Diploma in Art and Design and went on to teach part-time, and write and illustrate books. She and her husband came to live in Barbados during January 1984 and stayed for two years, though they returned every year until 1996. During her time of residence here, Ms. Berman painted the island's historical sites and buildings of architectural interest.


The watercolour "Barbados Museum" was executed in 1984, and was donated to the Museum by her husband Mr. Lawrence Berman on March 10, 2001. Pen and ink accentuates the details in the watercolour in this visually appealing technique.

Three other works of the same media by Ms. Berman were also donated to the Museum – "Farley Hill Park" (1984-5), "Codrington College" (1985), "House at Rockley" (1989).


UNESCO World Heritage Regional Meeting

Barbados played host to the UNESCO sponsored sub-regional conference on "Outstanding Universal Value, Authenticity and Integrity" May 9th to 11th at the Grand Barbados Resort. The conference participants came from 13 English-speaking Caribbean and Central and South American countries. The conference was an intense one that sought to identify and articulate the regions concept of Outstanding Universal Value, Authenticity and Integrity as it relates to World Heritage for the WHC and IUCN. The BMHS Director gave opening remarks and chaired the sessions. The Museum organised a bus tour on 9th May and co-hosted a dinner and tour of our galleries on 10th May, along with Culture Division from the Prime Minister's Office. The Minister of State in the Prime Minister's Office, Reverend the Honourable Joseph Atherley was present.

Trinidad National Museum and Gallery

The Director, Alissandra Cummins was invited to present a feature address on "The Role of Museums in preserving the Cultural Heritage and Engendering National Identity", during a public panel discussion organised on 17th May, as part of the activities of the Trinidad National Museum in celebration of International Museum Day. The entire event was taped for public broadcast on national television. The presentation and discussion was well-received and thoroughly explored in discussions with the audience afterwards.

The following day, Ms. Cummins joined the Association of Caribbean Historians annual conference held at the University of West Indies, St Augustine campus.

Art History Intern



Christine Skeete and Cindy Corbin have been appointed to the positions of Marketing Officer and Event Coordinator respectively after acting in these capacities for the past few months.


Welcome to New Staff Members




