


Tokens were given to 12 new and part-time employees, while other Museum employees were awarded in the categories of Three Years, Five Years and Ten Years of Service.

editor of the Journal of the Barbados Museum & Historical Society.




ICEE Meeting

Skeete, attended the International Committee on Exhibition Exchange (ICEE) Annual Meeting in Paris, France from 5th to 9th November. The trip was funded by a grant from the International Council of Museums (ICOM) for which young museum professionals may apply. The theme of the meeting was "The Exhibition: An Instrument of Dialogue Between Cultures," and the sessions focused on the marketing of travelling exhibitions and the expected benefits and challenges of their interpretation in different settings around the world.

Panel discussions addressed the theme of the meeting and issues such as language and literacy, and methods of reaching out to minority communities - relevant topics in the context of sending exhibitions abroad.

The Marketplace of Exhibitions and Ideas revealed the ways in which nine representatives of museums around the world present their travelling exhibitions. Promotional materials on these exhibitions were made available for all attendees.

The meeting was based at Museum
National d'Histoire Naturelle but
attendees also benefited from study tours
of Centre Pompidou and the new Musee
du Quai Branly, with talks by curators at
each site. Towards the end of the
meeting, the panel discussion "New
Directions" was held at the Swedish
Cultural Centre, where a farewell
reception for the group was hosted by
Ms. Annika Levin, the Director of the
Cultural Centre and Cultural Counsellor
of Sweden in France.

Alas Workshop in Mumbai

workshop was held in Mumbai, India from 22nd to 27th November, where the Education Officer, Ms. Peggy McGeary, and Registrar, Mrs. Angela Boyce, along with other team members from Nigeria and India, met to discuss and gather information from various exhibition designers on the drafting of guidelines for the conceptualisation of exhibitions in museums in a way that involves target groups from their communities.

The Barbados Museum and Historical Society, Living Heritage Centre Mumbai, and

the National Museum Calabar, as members of the Asia, Latin America, Swedish (ALAS) Museum network, have combined to work together on a project to produce the guidelines. It is




Some of the participants in Mumbai. Peggy McGeary and Angela Boyce are first and second from right, respectively.

intended that the final product will be a printed manual on "Guidelines for Conceptualising Exhibitions for Museums" focusing on small developing museums. This project is scheduled to be completed by June 2007.

ALAS is a museum network comprised of museums in any country with special interest and capacity to develop its institution through engagement and application of new thinking, new networking methods and tools elaborated in an international working context. SAMP (African-Swedish Museum Network) initiated ALAS as a part of its efforts to facilitate the development of museums in a

cross-border approach for the benefit of their communities, through working together in twin-ships, joint projects, capacity building and research.

SAMP/ALAS Workshop in Sweden

rom 5th to 11th November, the Assistant Curator - Art and Art History, Allison Callender, attended the Network Management Course 2B organised by SAMP/ALAS at Lansmuseet Vasternorrland, Harnosand in Sweden.

As a continuation of the first management course held in Madagascar in September, this course was the second and final part of the SAMP/ALAS Project Network Management course ttended by the same individuals from Madagascar, but acilitated by Mr. Paul Mupira from Zimbabwe, Ms. Elisabet Olofsson from Sweden and Mr. Klaus Godsk Kolberg from Denmark.


The group focused on the tools needed to evaluate a project. Specific sessions provided insight into the purpose of evaluation, the tools used, the benefits and types of evaluation. "Evaluation: A Manual for Museums" was distributed to all participants as a reference for evaluating projects and exhibitions.

One session following the formal course work allowed participants to learn how to make various types of craft. This session was led by three members of the staff of the Lansmuseet. They had participated in an ongoing project in Africa with African women and have adapted the skills learned there to

Swedish culture. The three women now teach children and adults throughout Sweden the art of beadwork. The samples made at Lansmuseet are not sold, but the craft facilitators are currently travelling through out the North of Sweden teaching this craft and encouraging Swedes to learn traditional skills.




Mr. Klaus Godsk Kolberg leading the Teambuilding course

The Teambuilding course was led by Mr. Klaus Godsk Kolberg from Denmark. Topics which Allison found were creative and highly informative included conflict management and negotiation, facilitation of group processes, and fostering creativity in teams.

Allison reports that at the end of the workshop, participants were equipped to meet the following objectives:

- Work with monitoring and evaluation in different museum functions and in SAMP/ALAS projects
- Give account for team building and conflict resolution in SAMP/ALAS context
- Give account for SAMP/ALAS role on advancing the relationship between SAMP/ALAS museums
- Appreciate the importance of working in intercultural networks
- Explain how SAMP could be institutionalised in their respective museums

ICAMT Meeting in the Netherlands

he Assistant Curator - Art and Art History, Allison Callender, attended the International Committee for Architecture and Museums Techniques (ICAMT) meeting in Rotterdam, Holland from 3rd to 5th December. The meeting was made possible through the ICOM 60th Anniversary Grants awarded to young museum professionals, and it provided an opportunity to exchange ideas on museum architecture, planning, construction and programming, as well as on exhibition production and design.

Visits to The Netherlands Institute of Architecture, The Museum Boijmans van Beuingen and Kunsthal were high on the agenda. The Director of each institution spoke of the history and significance of the building, the architectural features, the architects' concept behind the layout and design of the museum, and the day to day management of the museum, outlining problems and future plans. Allison found this information to be enlightening, as she learned that museums throughout the world share similar problems and have similar goals.

The Netherlands Architecture Institute (NAI)

This is an exhibition space, archive and library which together houses one of the world's most important collections of archives of architecture, interiors, landscape architecture and urban planning. The urban design for the building concentrated on integrating it with the existing structures that surround it. The new permanent exhibition entitled "Living in the Lowlands" showcases the collection's wealth of drawings, models and photographs, some of which were so intricately created, that they appear fragile. The NAI's Director explained the difficulty associated with housing such an exhibition of models since they are made from several different types of paper and fibres and represent a genuine conservation issue.

The Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen

The exhibits of the Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen portray the history of art from the Middle Ages to the present day. The intimate galleries of the 1935 Van der Steur Building feature works by artists such as Hieronymus Bosch and Peter Paul Rubens, Bruegel's Tower of Babel and Rembrandt's Titus.




Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen. The sculpture "Sylvette" by Pablo Picasso and Carl Nesjar

The Kunsthal

The Kunsthal Rotterdam is an expansive exhibition space which stages some 25 exhibitions a year. It also houses a book shop and café, and is an ideal place to relax and view the building, which is a work of art in itself. The Kunsthal is known to host a varied exhibition repertoire highlighting Impressionism, lingerie, Leonardo da Vinci, Blackfoot Indians, jewels of the Orient and Pop-art, experimenting with themes that often provide the first impulse for an exhibition.

Allison reports that there were further opportunities to visit a few other museums, and papers were also presented on a variety of topics. Jowa I. Kis-Jovak, the Director of Architectenbureau JOWA in Amsterdam spoke on "Lovely architecture! But How Should We Use It?" His paper discussed the ways in which architects design wonderful "buildings of art", which often are not practical or suitable as museum facilities. He stressed the need for museum personnel to work closely with architects and other relevant parties involved to create a structure that is both functional and practical.

Museum Highlights

Teacher's Professional Day Seminar

On 20th October, 17 teachers of the Gordon Greenidge Primary School came to the Museum for their Teacher's Professional Day Seminar which was led by the Education Officer, Peggy McGeary. The programme for the day consisted of a tour and brief seminar in the morning with the aim of exposing them to the many areas in which the Museum reinforces some of the topics done at the primary level. The afternoon session took the form of a bus tour to the Springvale Eco-Museum and Highland Pottery in Chalky Mount.

Re-opening of the West Wing of Parliament

The work of the BMHS as lead consultant on National Heroes Gallery and Museum of Parliament, reached a peak with the reopening of the West Wing of Parliament on 22nd November. The BMHS Director, Marketing Officer and Assistant Curator - History coordinated tours of the exhibition spaces immediately after the official ceremony.

Symbols of Independence Exhibition


The BMHS re-mounted its Symbols of Independence exhibition from 2nd to 30th November in celebration of Barbados' 40th Anniversary of Independence. This exhibition highlighted the origins and development of important symbols, such as the national flag, coat of arms and The Constitution.

Business and Professional Women's Club

On 23rd November at a special awards ceremony at the Savannah Hotel, BMHS Director Alissandra Cummins received one of four of the 40th anniversary awards presented by the Business and Professional Women's Club. The award recognised Ms. Cummins' service to heritage and international museum developments.


Fine Craft Festival

The 2006 Fine Craft Festival was held on 2nd December. This annual fundraising event had a higher profile this year and attracted 50 stall holders and large numbers of patrons. The BMHS donated a stall space to the Fine Arts Department of the Barbados Community College, to help the students to raise money for an upcoming trip. The Barbados Youth Business Trust was asked to introduce the Festival to its entrepreneurs as an outlet for their craft products and one of their beneficiaries took part in the event. The Challenor School's Creative Arts Centre participated for the second year. The event featured guided tours of the museum, mulatto girls in eighteenth century costume, a Victorian Father Christmas, a tuk band and donkey rides, among other new additions to the offerings.



Cocktail Receptions by Ministries

The Barbados Museum was the chosen venue for cocktail receptions held by the Ministry of Labour & Social Security as part of their Farm Labour Programme activities and for the hosting of Cuban officials by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade.

Visits from Overseas Librarians

The Shilstone Memorial Library of the BMHS received a visit from Ms Ingrid Iton, President of the Library Association of Barbados and Ms. Paula M. Smith, Reference Librarian at PennState Abington in Abington, Pennsylvania on 4th December. They met with BMHS Librarian Greta Payne and discussed plans and potential developments for the Museum Library.

What Did They Read in 18th Century Barbados?

Dr. David McKitterick delivered a lecture, sponsored by the BMHS and the University of the West Indies (UWI) and its Main Library, on 12th December at Lecture Theatre 4, UWI. The topic was "What Did They Read in 18th Century Barbados?" and it discussed a bookseller's catalogue of books shipped to Barbados around the 1720s. It was well attended and the audience included the British High Commissioner to Barbados, His Excellency Mr. Duncan Taylor and his wife. Décor, catering, programmes, bookmarks and artwork for print ads, were all impressively handled by UWI. Dr. McKitterick, who is a distinguished scholar and the Librarian at Trinity College, Cambridge, also made television and radio appearances which were coordinated by the Barbados Museum.

Journal of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society

A press conference was held on 20th December to announce the publication of Volume 52 of the Journal of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society. This issue of the journal features tributes to Ronnie Hughes and Warren Alleyne, among other intriguing historical topics. 


A painting entitled "Caribs of St. Vincent" by Agustin Brunias c 1730-1796.


