
Of course, we'll tell you what's new at the Museum, including a recent donation to our collections.

l've Got Rhythm: The Story of Jazz in Barbados

rom February 16 to April 19, visitors to the Barbados Museum were taken on a journey through the development of jazz on the island. The exhibition I've Got Rhythm: The Story of Jazz in Barbados traced the longstanding relationship between Barbados and jazz, and the celebrated international musicians that are a part of this story.

It was launched with a fundraising concert on February 15, featuring an impressive line up of local jazz talent - the Ebe Gilkes Trio and Rosemary Phillips who was backed by Andre Woodvine, Stefan Walcott, Richard "Bill"

Evans, Tony Scrooge and Willie Kerr. Patrons were also treated to an exclusive sneak preview of the jazz exhibition. What is the story of jazz, you may wonder. Did you know that jazz music has been present on the

island since the 1920s? After the end of the First World War, returning soldiers and migrant workers may have returned home with some recordings and memories of this new music, but it in the years leading up to and following the Second World War Barbadians became more exposed to this music through listening to the travelling bands that toured the region.

The jazz scene in Barbados had its own era of big bands swinging, ensembles bebopping and late night jam sessions at . venues like the once-famous Belair Night Club.





Jazz has moved from clubs and hotels to seasonal shows in the main, whether the Barbados Jazz Festival, Christmas Jazz or Notes to Notes Cool Jazz shows. Older Barbadians may recall listening to jazz at the Paragon or Driftwood Inn.

Today, establishments like Waterfront Cafe, Naniki Restaurant, Lobster Alive, and recently McValedyn's, offer jazz all year round. Our educational system encourages the continuation of the artform in schools and beyond. However, jazz musicians lament the lack of venues and opportunity to ply their trade.

The Museum's jazz concert, however, provided a rare opportunity to bring the best in local jazz talent together on one stage. The concert and exhibition were supported by gold sponsor the Coca-Cola Company, silver sponsor Virgin Atlantic, and supporting partner Dover Beach Hotel.

2009 Lecture Series

The 2009 Lecture Series under the theme Slavery in Barbados got underway on February 03 with Prof. Sir Hilary Beckles speaking on the topic "Why Slavery in Barbados?". It continued through February and March with the following:

Lectures scheduled to continue in April were:

April 07 "From the Ground Up: The Archaeological Data on Slavery in Barbados" by Dr. Thomas Loftfield

April 14 "'Testing the Chains': Resistance to Slavery" by Prof. Alvin Thompson

All lectures were held at Solidarity House and were well attended. For the first time in the history of the Lecture Series, audio from the lectures were streamed live on the Internet. The number of hits on the relevant website were higher than anticipated. Significant interest was generated in the region and even in the United States. At least one lecture was aired online by NBC 700 A.M., www. nbcsvg.com, in St. Vincent, while a lecturer in the Department of Africana and Puerto Rico/ Latino Studies at Hunter College, City University of New York (CUNY) made the live sessions the focus of her classes. Stephen Howard of WBAI 99.5 FM in New York City featured the live streaming link on the station's own 24 hour live stream on www.wbai.org and has expressed an interest in rebroadcasting the lectures and interviewing lecturers via telephone.


Individuals, some from as far afield as the United Kingdom, who were unable to catch the streaming due to other commitments queried whether downloadable audio would be made available on the Internet. Listen out for an update on this mechanism as well as the potential availability of lectures on CD and DVD for sale.

Where Did All Those Books Go?

s the first port of call for many ships crossing the Atlantic, Barbados was in an advantageous position. It traded both with Europe and with the Caribbean islands and the east coast of North America. On March 26 at the Barbados Museum, Prof. David McKitterick delivered the public lecture Where Did All Those Books Go? Barbados and Beyond in the Early Eighteenth Century before a captivated audience.

In his lecture, Prof. McKitterick continued his 2006 exploration of the early eighteenth century book trade in this area, and showed how it was linked both to missionary enterprise and the trade in luxury goods.

Professor McKitterick, FBA, is Librarian and Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge. He has written widely on the history of the book, its design, its sale and its use. He is one the general editors of the History of the Book in Britain, of which the volume covering the years 1830-1914 was published earlier this month. His lecture addressed some of the work for a forthcoming study of part of the early eighteenth-century Atlantic book trade.

Gordon Parkinson Paintings Get a New Home


On the Rocks - Bathsheba



The International Advisory Committee (IAC) of UNESCO's Memory of the World Programme will hold its 9th meeting from July 29 to July 30 at the Accra Beach Hotel, Barbados.

Immediately preceding the IAC meeting will be a Sub-Regional Workshop of the Caribbean countries engaged in the Memory of the World programme.

The workshop will take place from July 27 to July 28 at the Blue Horizon Hotel, Barbados.

Objectives of 2009 workshop

- To assist countries with crafting potential nominations for the 2011 round of inscriptions;
- To better acquaint participants with the procedures of the MoW programme;
- To promote and strengthen MoW in the region;
- To develop a CARICOM MoW action plan for 2009-2011.

Also to be discussed at this workshop, given its Caribbean connections, is the Indian Indentureship nomination being spearheaded by Mr. Setareki Tale Director of the National Archives of Fiji and lead coordinator of the Global Team on the Indian Indentured Labourers MoW nomination. This is a particularly unique nomination as its stakeholders are globally-based given the international scope of the practice of Indian Indentureship.

Help Us Put Barbados on the Medical Map

Fraser and the widow of Dr. Harry Bayley, Iris Bannochie, published a letter in the British Medical Journal (BMJ) entitled "Fifty Years of Penicillin". This is freely available on the internet at http://www.pubmedcentral.nih.gov/articlerender.fcgi?artid=1596190

Through this letter, the claim was revealed that after Dr. Harry Bayley returned from Oxford University to marry his love - giving up his work with Dr. Florey (Nobel prize winner for penicillin) in 1939. He and his new wife grew their own penicillin in their home and used it to treat patients - in 1940, months before the first penicillin was used on patients in the UK! The penicillin was grown in Gordon's Gin bottles, in a darkened bedroom. These bottles were actually ideally shaped for penicillin growth and were later used in

England on a massive scale for the same purpose.

Michael Marshall of Halifax, Canada is currently writing a book on penicillin and feels Dr. Bayley and Barbados' claim deserves to be much better known.

Dr. Henry Fraser, clinical pharmacologist and Dean of the Faculty of Medical Sciences of the University of the West Indies, who incidentally is a Museum member, has recently been in touch with Michael Marshall and has clarified that the account of Dr. Bayley's penicillin story in the British Medical Journal had come directly from his widow, Iris Bannochie. She was also his brilliant lab technician, trained by him! She is the author of two distinguished papers in the British Journal of Biology on the embryology of the whistling frog of Barbados (which has no tadpole stage).

Unfortunately she is now deceased, having developed the well-respected Andromeda Gardens in Barbados. However, Dr. Fraser has indicated to Marshall that there is one surviving doctor who worked closely with Dr. Bayley when he was very young.

Does anyone have any other information linked to this story? Does anyone know exactly when in 1940 the first patients were treated and also whether the penicillin was used only topically or was injected into patients?
