## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR 1984 — 1986

### COUNCIL

## ATTENDANCE

During the years May 1st, 1984 to March 31st, 1986 a total of 21,628 adults, children and school teachers visited the Museum. Some of these were tickets purchased in bulk.

In addition the show "1627 and All That" brought in 26,869 visitors, of whom were strangers to the island.

## PUBLICATIONS

Journals Volume XXXVII Nos. 3 and 4 were published in January 1985 and January 1986 respectively, under the direction of Mr. Peter Campbell as editor. The Newsletter was published in January, June, September 1984 and March, July and October 1985, and January 1986, respectively, with the Director as editor.

## EXHIBITIONS

Several new exhibitions were installed in the recently re-decorated Exhibition Gallery. Between June 2—23, 1984, the Museum was host to the Children's Art Exhibition for World Environment Day organised by the Caribbean Conservation Association.

Earlier in the year, the previous Director Mr. David Devenish, developed a small military exhibition of loan items from the Museum's collection which was installed at Gun Hill. He also worked on re-organising the Amerindian archaeology display at Harrison's Cave.

Between September — October 1984 the Museum was once again working with C.C.A. in producing an exhibition on "Conserving the Environment" for their Annual General Meeting

held at the Dover Convention Centre. The Exhibition was later removed to the Museum.

From December 18, 1984 to January 18, 1985 the paintings of Mrs. Kathleen Berman were on display in the Exhibition Gallery.

On April 10, 1985, the Honourable Minister for Education, Miss Billie Miller officially opened the Brunias Exhibition in the Cunard Gallery. The display was especially designed to highlight the six paintings by the artist, Agostino Brunias which are now on loan to the Museum for five years from the Peter Moores Foundation.

Miss Philippa Newton, Assistant Curator Natural History, organised an exhibition on the Graeme Hall Swamp for the Working Group set up by the Caribbean Conservation Association. This exhibition was open to the public on June 4 and 5, 1985 at the Queen's Park Steel Shed.

The Aal Gallery with a display of original antique maps of Barbados was opened on June 24, 1985. The Gallery was renovated and airconditioning has been installed. Mrs. Sally Aall, a member of the Historical Society was the generous donor of an important collection of antique maps and assisted in the planning of the Gallery.

A joint exhibition of paintings was installed by Carlton Murrell and Fielding Babb between June 26 and July 6, 1985. Other exhibitions included Alliance Française — Poster exhibition of Victor Hugo (February 7 to 14, 1986), Lithographs by Joscelyn Gardner (February 21 — March 14, 1986), and paintings by Neville Legall. — (March 21 — May 9th, 1986)

## TRAVEL

The Peace Corps Curators, Dave and Joan Robinson visited Nevis for the month of September, 1984 at the request of the Nevis National Trust in order for them to prepare a report on their museum development.

Miss Cummins and Miss Newton also visited St. Lucia on April 21, 1985 for the official opening of the Maria Island Nature Reserve. This unique facility will be of interest to all those involved in the conservation of our natural resources.

During May 14 — 20, 1985 the Director attended a conference for “Conservation of Natural Resources of the Caribbean — Opportunities for Public/Private Partnerships” sponsored by Partners for Livable Places in Washington, D.C.

Philippa Newton, Assistant Curator for Natural History travelled to Guyana during June 8 — 29, 1985 to follow a course of training in taxidermy at the Guyana Museum and Zoo, sponsored by the Organisation of American States.

Puerto Rico was the venue of the International Congress on Pre-Columbian Archaeology of the Lesser Antilles during July 28 — August 3, 1985. The Museum was represented by A. Cummins, L. Cutsinger and S. Hackenberger.

The annual general meeting of the Caribbean Conservation Association was held in Dominica from September 11 — 14, 1985. The topic of the technical sessions was “Environmental Education Now”. The Director attended as the Museum’s representative.

Partners of the Americas were the hosts of a visit by the Director to the New York State Museum at Albany during November 9 — 22, 1985. This visit comprised discussions with the curatorial staff of the museum on education, conservation, exhibition design and collections management.

## ACTIVITIES

As a project in community outreach the Museum held a series of open-days for Hoteliers on April 26, Taxi Drivers May 2, and Tourism and Travel Personnel on May 9, 1984. Response was not as wide as we could have hoped for but it was at least a beginning.

To celebrate the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Museum building a barbecue was held on May 12, 1984. A modest profit of some \$2,000.00 was made, but it was an encouraging sign of members interest and support. We hope to develop an entertainments committee which will organise similar events during the coming year.

On May 23, 1984, Mr. Lennox Honychurch gave a fascinating lecture on the Cabrits, a military fortification on the island of Dominica.

The Barbados Museum was the host of a Workshop for Museum Curators mainly from the Commonwealth Caribbean, held

between November 12 — 20, 1984 under the auspices of the Caribbean Conservation Association and the O.A.S. under the directorship of Professor Soto Soria of Mexico. Delegates attended from Anguilla, Antigua, Cayman Islands, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Trinidad & Tobago, Costa Rico and Suriname.

The Inter-American Bar Association held a dinner at the Museum on November 12, 1984 and a luncheon on February 24, 1985.

The film "Freedom Is" was shown to the general public on November 14, 1984 in the Exhibition Gallery. This was very well supported by a large audience.

Mr. Robert Dunning gave a lecture of the Monmouth Rebellion on April 29, 1985. A good number of members turned out to hear him speak.

"Barbados and the Carolina Connection" was the title of an interesting lecture given by Mr. Warren Alleyne and Dr. Henry Fraser on October 18, 1985. In it they looked at the significant role played by Barbadians in the exploration and settlement of the Carolinas.

The Alliance Française were the hosts of a superb wine and cheese party held at the Museum on November 1st, 1985. The event was hailed by all as a great success.

December 6, 1985 saw the arrival of a team of ten archaeologists from the Institute of Archaeology in London. Led by Peter Drewett, Director of the field unit, the team during the five weeks of their stay covered the coastal areas for an initial survey of amerindian sites. Test pits were dug at Heywoods, St. Peter and Hillcrest, St. Joseph. They also carried out a systematic analysis of several local collections including the Museum's artifacts and the Roach collection at Harrison's Cave. Two explanatory lectures were given by Dr. Drewett on the team's activities.

A Christmas carol concert was held by the Cecilian Singers during the evening of December 22, 1985. Lead by Mrs. Doris Provençal, the choir gave a superb concert of carols old and new.

The Barbados Museum were the coordinators of a week long island tour for a special group from the Colonial Williamsburg

Foundation. Group leader Mr. William Cole gave a presentation on Colonial Williamsburg on January 17, 1986. This was well attended by the public.

The Family Planning Association was the host of a special fund-raising cabaret held at the Museum on March 18, and 25, 1986 respectively.

### **THE ROYAL VISIT**

The Barbados Museum was recently honoured on October 28, 1985 by a visit from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh. Their presence marked the opening of a new exhibition installed in the Jubilee Gallery entitled "In Search of Bim".

### **MUSEUM DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

The Capital Works programme during the year 1984-85 included the electrical rewiring of the entire Museum premises, the renovation of the Library, the Jubilee, Harewood and Aall Galleries. The building of new bathrooms and the repainting of the main facade, the other galleries and the administrative offices were completed.

During 1985-86 new lights were installed in the Harewood Gallery, and extensive work was done in the Jubilee Gallery to set up a historical display for "In Search of Bim", including special cases and panels. Air conditioning was installed in the Aall Gallery and the Library.

### **STAFF CHANGES**

Miss Alissandra Cummins became the Director of the Barbados Museum, following the completion of Mr. Devenish's contract, on March 1st 1985.

Peace Corps Staff Dave and Joan Robinson left Barbados in June 1985 to continue Museum work in Nevis. They have been replaced by two other Peace Corps Curators, Steve Hackenberger and Loran Cutsinger.

Guards Clairmont Clarke and Laurie Brewster were retired in November, 1985 and were awarded gratuities by the Council for services rendered.



## LIBRARY

From January 30 — March 31st 1985 the Library was closed while a complete stocktaking was undertaken and an improved card system for periodicals was instituted. The installation of an airconditioning unit was completed and now affords us a greater opportunity for the conservation of rare books and other valuable materials in the Library's holdings. The Library was also completely renovated and redecorated following the advice of Mrs. Jean Blondin. Her assistance was greatly appreciated.

A Coffee Morning was held on January 10th, 1986, donations from the event helped to buy new books for the Library.

Forty-seven (47) persons visited the Library during this period and these came mainly from Canada, Great Britain and U.S.A. 225 persons did research. Topics included research on families, History of Barbados, Slaves, cricket etc.

Some 254 new publications were added to the Library during the period. On June 13th there was a presentation of books by the British High Commissioner. June 18th Hilary Beckles made a presentation of his book "Black Rebellion". On December 3rd, the American Women's Club presented the Library with a visible Index for magazines.

On May 2nd 1985, a Brunch was held at the home of the Librarian for Volunteer workers.

## DONATIONS

During 1984, the Barbados Museum completed a major programme of improving its artifact, archival and conservation facilities utilizing a grant of US\$14,400 from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID). This has made it possible for the Curatorial staff to store and shelve all artifacts in a much more professional manner. We have also been able to develop photographic facilities and to establish a basic collection of laboratory chemicals and equipment which will help in the general preservation of our collections. This was one of the major contributions for the year.

**The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) contributed in November, 1985 the sum of Can. \$5,517.00**

**(Bds.\$7,950.00) towards the setting up of displays in the Jubilee Gallery. This was much appreciated.**

The Museum was also the fortunate recipient of a British Book Programme grant of £750.00 which has enabled the Museum to purchase over 100 books vital for the curatorial and conservation functions of the Museum.

The Museum's application for an O.A.S. grant of some US\$9,700.00 was successful and enabled us to purchase equipment and materials which assisted in upgrading and improving our History and Natural History exhibits located in the Jubilee and Harewood Galleries.

**In 1984, Mrs. Sally Aall donated a series of maps to the Barbados Museum, and these are now housed in an air conditioned splendour of the Aall Gallery.**

1. **INCORPORATION**

c) **SUBSCRIPTION INCOME**

The financial statements are expressed in Barbados Dollars.

e) **INVESTMENTS**

Investments in debentures are stated at cost. Dividends on debentures are recognised as income in the year of receipt.
